1 Introduction

1.1 Background of Thilawa Special Economic Zone (SEZ)

Since November 2011, the Myanmar Government has been planning economic restructuring from the current structure that mainly depends on agriculture, forestry, and fisheries, to a new structure that focuses on labor-intensive industries such as manufacturing and services. To boost such economic restructuring it has been proposed to attract direct investment and market entry by companies from developed countries that have important resources such as technology, capital, management skills, and sales skills. The Myanmar government has placed a priority on attracting Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in order to achieve economic




Figure 1-1 Location of Thilawa SEZ Development Area

development. As such, three Special Economic Zones (SEZs) have been earmarked for development; these are in Thilawa, Dawei, and Kyaukphyu.

Thilawa SEZ is located in Yangon Region about 20 km on the southeast side of Yangon city. The Thilawa SEZ covers an area of about 2,400 ha alongside the Thilawa Port. Thilawa SEZ land for factories near Yangon, to promote the country's industrialization as well as generate jobs for Myanmar people. This project is expected to support sustainable economic development for Myanmar, contributing to improved living standards for its people and the development of industries that can meet rising domestic demand.

The land use plan for the entire development area of Thilawa SEZ has been prepared based on the above development concept. The Phase 1 area of about 400 ha (Phase I area) has been selected as a priority development. This Phase 1 area was planned to be developed as a base for significant investment from foreign and domestic companies, supporting the country's industrialization. Myanmar Japan Thilawa Development Ltd. (MJTD) is a joint venture between the Myanmar and Japanese governments and companies from both countries.

Development Plan of Zone B Area: As part of the 2000ha Development Area, the development plan of approximately 700 ha is now being formulated as Phase 2 / Zone B (the Zone B Development Area). The Zone B Development Area consists of approximately 262 ha of Industrial Area, 267 ha of Logistic Area and 169 ha of Residence & Commercial Area as shown in Figure 1-3. Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) study on the Zone B Development Area was also conducted in parallel with planning.

Approximately 100 ha out of 262 ha was identified as the Initial Development Area of the Industrial Area (Area 2-1), while the remaining

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approximately 162 ha is also planned to be developed as the Second Development Area (Area

2-2). Accordingly, the RWP was prepared for Area 2-1 in August 2016, and the RWP is being prepared for the remaining area as the Second Development Area (Area 2-2) in Area 2 separately based on the contents stipulated in the Framework prepared by TSMC in February 2016

1.2 Management of the Thilawa SEZ Resettlement Program

The Yangon Region Government (YRG) is the responsible body for implementation of the Resettlement Work Plan (RWP) that was prepared for the Phase 1 area. Two sub-committees have also been established, chaired by the Administrators of General Administration Departments (GADs) of Thanlyin and Kyauktan Townships. One sub-committee is Relocation Implementation Sub-Committee (RISC), which deals with disbursement of monetary assistance and the arrangement of living conditions at the relocation site (RS). The other sub-committee is Income Restoration Program Implementation Sub-Committee (IRPSC), which manages the implementation of the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The Thilawa SEZ Management Committee (TSEZMC) is a cooperative agency, supporting YRG, RISC and IRPSC in the smooth implementation of the RWP including the IRP. The responsibility of TSEZMC is: "to cooperate with YRG, RISC and IRPISC to support for resettlement works as needed, such as schedule management of relocation and development of SEZ area and facilitation of the job recruitment of project affected persons (PAPs) in the SEZ area" in accordance with [Pg III.28, Interim Report on Technical Assistance for Preparation of Resettlement Work Plan in Myanmar].

1.3 Thilawa Phase 2 Resettlement and Income Restoration Program

1.3.1 Phase 2 Resettlement Program

From 4 to 26 April 2013 (April Census), field surveys were conducted for census and socio-economic information for all of households living inside the Thilawa SEZ Development Area. DMS was conducted to supplement information collected in the April Census and to confirm assets of PAHs/PAPs during May 2014 and October 2015 for the 2000ha Development Area. An additional DMS was carried out in December 2016 for households who were not surveyed in DMS. According to DMS, the number of PAHs and PAPs to be affected by the development of Area 2-2 East are 99 and 387, respectively as of December 2016. PAHs have been divided into five groups (A to E) depending on the types of impacts as per DMS. Cut-off date (COD) is the day to determine eligibility for entitlement of compensation and/or assistance. Persons (or households) living or performing income generation activities inside the area of Thilawa SEZ on COD are eligible for compensation and/or assistance package. The principles of eligibility for the compensation and/or assistance package are shown below:

- (1) Households living inside the Second Development Area (Area 2-2 East) on the day of COD.
- (2) Households occupying some area inside the Second Development Area (Area 2-2 East) on the day of COD by doing income generation activities or holding structures though living outside the Initial Development Area.
- (3) Households whose land is under the official land acquisition procedure.

Actually, IRP is proposed to be composed of two main components: Component-1: as for all PAPs, support for restoration of economic conditions through a combination of activities for enhancement of income earning opportunities and household account management, Component-2: as for PAPs who are resettled to new place, support for adapting environmental and social living conditions through community development

As described in the RWP, the loss of house was assisted by providing a substitute house at the RS or the equivalent money to cover house construction costs for those who prefer to construct their own house at the RS. Monetary assistance was also provided for losses of other fixed assets (livestock barns), large livestock (buffalo and cow) and agriculture machines. Loss of means of livelihood for land-based and non-land-based income sources was assisted with monetary assistance for improving or restoring livelihoods to at least preproject level. As for land-based income sources, monetary assistance was calculated based on crop yield by referring to national regulations. As for non-land-based income sources, monetary assistance was paid in the form of an allowance of wages for the period of disrupting income generating activities due to relocation. In addition to assistance for loss of assets and income sources, monetary assistance for moving, commuting and cooperation for relocation was provided to enhance smooth relocation and to support commuting after relocation.

Assistance for vulnerable groups was provided since relocation affects vulnerable groups more severely than others. The project defines as vulnerable a household headed by a woman, disabled person or an elderly person (over 61 years old), a household including a disabled person or a household below the poverty line.

1.3.2 Income Restoration Program (IRP)

Households living in or engaged in income generating activities inside the Phase I area whose livelihoods were affected due to implementation of the Phase 2 project are eligible to participate in the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The IRP is in-kind assistance provided to PAPs in order to restore and stabilise their livelihoods and income sources. The IRP focuses on diversified economic activities for PAPs to generate income for three years after resettlement, to enable them to cover their basic needs after relocation. In order to restore their livelihoods, the development of Phase 2 is providing PAPs with an assistance package through the IRP, which includes vocational training and other support measures.

The IRP aims to assist PAPs to have job opportunities in/around Thilawa SEZ and to be engaged in small scale businesses. The IRP is being provided to all PAPs including the following (as per RWP):

- a) Farmers who need to change from farming to another income earning activity;
- b) Daily casual workers and other off-farm workers who want to change job location;
- c) Unemployed people who want to improve their technical skills to find a job; and
- d) PAPs that do not need to change their current income earning activities but want to improve their technical skills and/or income level.

2 Objectives of the External Monitoring

Monitoring and evaluation of the progress of the resettlement works and IRP is conducted by independent third party, focusing on PAPs of the Phase 1 and 2 areas only (where resettlement has already occurred). The objectives of the 1rd external monitoring for Phase 2 are to:

- To monitor the changes of socio-economic conditions of PAPs during the interval period
- To provide recommendations in the implementation of RWP and IRP to improve effectiveness

3 Scope of the Monitoring

3.1 Work Period

Data collection for socio-economic survey started on 13th December 2017 and ended on 22nd December 2017. After conducting the survey, data entry was conducted and completed on 27th January 2018. Data cleaning and data analysis finished on 7th January 2018. The first draft report was submitted on 20th February 2018. The report will be finalized by the end of February 2018 after incorporating comments from JICA Expert Team.

3.2 Methodology Used and Sources of Information

- ✓ Document review
- ✓ Socio-economic survey for Project Affected Households. The household questionnaires used for this External Monitoring are included in Annexes 2 to 6.
- ✓ One focus group discussion with microfinance committee
- ✓ Observation on project sites

3.3 Impact Monitoring of the RWP Implementation

To see the impact of the RWP implementation, the socio-economic survey was conducted to see any changes in PAF's livelihood. The survey parameters of the socio-economic survey were designed to obtain data and information on a range of specific issues as follows: the conditions of the RS and housing and infrastructure; settlement at the RS; restoration/re-establishment of livelihoods and living standards; the effectiveness, impact and sustainability of entitlements and the IRP; and the potential need for further improvements. The parameters chosen were organised in the survey questionnaires in the following themes:

- Demography;
- Livelihoods, Income and Expenditure;
- Housing and Infrastructure at RS;
- Ownership of Assets;
- Education and Health Care;
- Environmental Conditions; and
- Communications, Social Networks and Social Cohesion.

A series of open and closed questions were included in the household questionnaire under each of these key themes. As described above, these were tailored for the different groups targeted in the survey. The questionnaire forms for the socio-economic survey are attached in Annex 2-6.

3.4 Targeted Groups for Monitoring

A number of different categories of PAPs were targeted for the monitoring survey as well as members of the Host Community at Myaing Tharyar and PAPs living at relocation site (A) Zone A, Phase I for a comparison with the resettled/displaced population. It was also important to obtain data from new residents at the RS, including those who have rented or purchased houses from PAPs. The following table lists the different categories of people targeted for the survey, the number of households targeted in each group and the number actually surveyed.

3.5 Organization of the Survey Team

The team of TWA Rural Development Service (known herein as "TWA") consists of a number of Myanmar national staff, all of whom have experience in the field of rural livelihood improvement, participatory community development and community mobilisation.

4 Process of Monitoring

Existing Data Review and Preparation of the Field Activities (Site Visits, Socio-economic Survey) TWA reviewed and examined the profile of the PAPs and also reviewed progress reports such as the RWP and IRP documentations prepared by JICA expert team. TWA then mobilized a survey team comprised of surveyors in December 2017. TWA provided two-day training to the surveyors on the objective of the survey, the meanings of the survey questionnaires, the responsibility and role of the surveyors, and data collection and data entry procedures.

4.1 Additional Data Collection and Data Entry

The field survey of the Socio-economic survey started on 13th December 2017 and ended on 22nd December 2017. The surveyors explained the questionnaires to the survey respondents and collected the data, and checked all the data not to be missed in the questionnaire forms in the field. After the data gathering process, the data was processed in parallel to data cleaning. The data input was then cross-checked again to ensure the relevance to the information sought through the questionnaires.

4.2 Data Analysis

Data was processed and analysed in Microsoft Excel through the following steps by data analyst and surveyors during January 2018. Cleaned the data and entered it into an excel file;

- Listed tables and charts inferred from the baseline and current data;
- Summarized the data collected;
- Finalized the results of the survey; and
- Created charts and tables to display the survey results; and interpreted the charts and tables.

4.4 Limitations

This external monitoring report/evaluation is mainly based on interactions with PAPs through the socio-economic survey and review of the existing monitoring documents and other resettlement-related records by the external monitoring consultants. This evaluation is not a review of the RWP against international standards, and no assessment has been made about whether or not the RWP is fit-for-purpose in accordance with the relevant standards.

5 Results of Socio-economic Survey of the Project Affected Persons

5.1 Demography

The table (5-1) divides the household characteristics of project affected people into Zone A (phase 1) and Zone B (phase 2). Comparison was made among PAPs living at the relocation site in Zone A (phase 1) and PAPs living at the relocation site (A), PAPs sold/rented out at the relocation site (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) in Zone B (phase 2), Host community (D) and New owners/renters (E).

Average household size of all PAPs (A) in Zone A and B and Host community are in the range of 4 and 5 except New owners/renters. 78% of New owners/renters (E) are between the age of 18 and 60, followed by 71% of PAPs economically displaced only (C), 65% of PAPs sold/rented out at RS (B), 64% of Host community (D), 60% of PAPs living at RS (A) from Zone B, 51% of PAPs living RS (A) from Zone A. The highest dependency ratio (1.6) is found in PAPs living at RS (A) from Zone B while the least dependency ratio (0.5) in PAPs economically displaced only (C).

The comparison was made the household characteristics of the first EMS, second EMS, third EMS and fourth EMS for those PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) only. It is found that working age group between 18 to 60 of PAPs living at relocation site (A) has been just over 50% at every EMS. The average household size has been around 5 people per family. Dependency ratio reduced to 1.5 compared with the first, second and third external monitoring survey (EMS).

Dependency ratio is the highest in PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B, followed by PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A. PAPs economically displaced only (C) from Zone B has the least dependency ratio among PAPs.

PAPs living at relocation site from Zone A and B have bigger family size than other different types of PAPs and non-PAPs. Although there are many family members in PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and B, number of working people is less than that of dependent people in their households.

5.2 Changes in Job for Household Heads

After the third EMS, household heads' job of PAPs living at relocation site A (Zone A) changed to 23%.

5.3 Location of Work

Respondents were asked to identify their current location of work. Over 50% of respondents from all categories are working in Kyauktan Township, with the significance figure (80%) of new owners/renters at the relocation site (E). 32% of households of PAPs living at relocation site from Zone (A), Phase 1 works at Thanlyin township, followed by 29% of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B).

5.4 Transportation to Work

Modes of transportation commonly used by respondents are public transport, ferry bus, motorbike taxi, motorbike, bicycle and on foot. Host community (D) mainly use either public transport or motorbike for going to work. Majority of New owners/ renters (E) go to work by ferry bus, followed by motorbike. PAPs economically displaced only (C) use most either ferry bus or motorbike to go to work. Most of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) use motorbike as a main transportation. PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B Phase II mainly travel by ferry bus while those living at relocation site (A) from Zone A Phase I mainly used motorbike for their location to work. It can be seen that respondents travel to work by using different means of transportation based on their location of work.

5.5 Household Income and Expenditure

The table (5-5) shows average monthly and annual household income of all types of respondents from Zone A Phase I, Zone B Phase II, Host community and New owners/renters. Of total respondents surveyed, PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A Phase I earn the least average income per annum (2,941,385 MMK) while Host community (D) earn the highest income (7,204,800 MMK) annually. In Zone B, average annual income of PAPs economically displaced only (C) is the highest (6,672,000 MMK), followed by PAPs living at relocation site (A) and PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B).

The table (5-6) shows per capita income of different types of respondents annually and monthly. If compared with per capita income per month among project affected people from Zone A and Zone B, monthly income of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) Phase I is just half of PAPs from Zone B. Of PAPs from Zone (B) Phase II, PAPs living at relocation site (A) have the least per capita income per month (106,649 MMK), followed by PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) and PAPs living at relocation site (A). It is found that per capita income of New Owners/ renters (E) is the highest (172,577 MMK/month).

Common primary and secondary income sources are wage work, odd job and home business. Very few people are still engaged in rice farming and livestock related activities. All types of respondent categories have primary and secondary income sources. 35% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A work as wage workers, followed by 19% as odd jobs, and 12% as home business. In Zone B, PAPs living at relocation site (A) are mostly engaged in odd jobs (36%), wage workers (31%) and home business (13%). Home business is found as major primary income source for PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) from Zone B, followed by wage worker and odd job. 60% of economically displaced only (c) from Zone B work as wage workers, followed by home business (40%).

From this income source tables (5-8 and 5-9), it can be learnt that majority of any types of PAPs have to be engaged in odd job due to the loss of their traditional livelihood such as rice farming and livestock. Income sources are vital for their livelihood survival. It is suggested that investment advice should come together with compensation for their long-term survival so that they can cope with new environment.

The table (5-10) illustrates the average annual and monthly expenditure spent by respondents from Phase I and II. PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) from Zone B Phase II have the highest expenditure per month, followed while PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A have the least monthly expenditure.

In comparison of monthly expenditure and income of PAPs from Zone A and Zone B, it is found that the monthly expenditure (343,277 MMK) of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A exceed their monthly earning (245,115 MMK) although their spending on expenditures is the least. As for different categories of PAPs from Zone B and Non-PAPs, their monthly income outweighs their monthly expenditure.

The table (5-12) shows food and non-food expenditure annually consumed by PAPs from Zone A /B and Non-PAPs. Except New owners/renters, all types of respondents spent more on food expenditure than non-food expenditure. The highest spending on food expenditure per annum (3,419,714 MMK) is found in PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) from Zone B as well as for highest spending on annual non-food expenditures (2,515,600 MMK).

5.6 Savings

Very few PAPs and non-PAPs (under 43%) have savings. The PAPs living in the RS (A) for the Phase II have the least savings (18%). Those PAPs who sold/rented a house at the RS (B) have the highest saving level (43%) amongst the respondents, followed by the new owners/renters with the saving level (40%). Most of the households with savings keep their money at a bank or at home. The PAPs at RS (A) from Phase I have the access to credit groups and therefore, all of them are accessing credit readily. One of the factors that have resulted among the respondents is that about 20% of them use their money in investing in business.

In terms of credit group membership the new owners/renters living in the RS are not members of a credit group. Credit group members are found amongst the other categories, except the new owners/renters living in the RS. This indicates that PAPs and Renters living in the RS, which is a relatively new settlement, are not yet accessing available credit groups.



The table (5-14) shows the comparison of saving and credit group members households of PAPs at relocation site (A) only from Zone A. There are some fluctuations in savings for PAPs at RS during four consecutive external monitoring surveys. The saving rate has dropped down from 55% to 42% at 4^{th} EMS. There is only one percentage increment in credit group members. The highest percentage (85%) of credit group members was found only at 2^{nd} EMS.

5.7 Debt and Indebtedness

The table (5-15) shows that indebtedness of respondents in Phase I and II. The minimum and maximum range of debt level varies among all types of PAPs and non-PAPs. The minimum debt is the range between 30,000 MMK and 400,000 MMK and the maximum debt is the range of between 200,000 MMK and 10,000,000 MMK. 73% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A borrowed money, followed by PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B (59%) and PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) from Zone B (50%). 20% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) are in debt.

It is found that the debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and Zone B are 9,000,000 MMK and 10,000,000 MMK respectively. Their indebtedness is much higher than the remaining types of respondents.

But it is found that the number of households borrowed money has sharply increased at 4th EMS. The maximum debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) 9,000,000 MMK and the minimum debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) 500,000 MMK.

Food shortage occurred in PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A, PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site from Zone B. 10% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B had the experiences of food shortage, followed by PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) 5% from Zone B and PAPs living at relocation site (A) 4% from Zone A.

5.9 Ownership of Moveable Assets

The table (5-19) shows that different types of moveable assets owned by PAPs from Zone A and B. There are three types of moveable assets. Electric fan, fridge, inverter, small generator and TV are included in moveable asset type 1. Bicycle, motorbike, gondow (handy tractor) and tractor belong to moveable asset type 2. Phone, water pump, sewing machine, solar, battery, radio and washing machine are in moveable asset type 3.

The majority of moveable asset types for all different categories of PAPs are TV, motorbike and phone. It is found that PAPs economically displaced only (C) are the least users for any moveable asset types while PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (C) are the highest users for every moveable asset types.

5.10 Housing and Infrastructure

The table (5-20) shows the conditions of household ownership, toilet types, water standing, electricity, safety and security, water resources and drinking water of PAPs from Zone A/B and non-PAPs.

In terms of household ownership of respondents, all PAPs from Zone A and B owned their houses except PAPs sold/rented out at RS (B) from Zone B.

In terms of toilet types used by respondents, majority of PAPs and Non-PAPs use improved latrine/septic tanks.

In terms of water standing around houses in the raining season, 80% of Host community (D) experienced water standing around houses, followed by 38% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and 27% of New owners/renters. 7% to 20% of PAPs households from Zone B have water standing around houses.

In terms electricity, 100% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and B have electricity. Around 80% of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) and PAPs

economically displaced only (C) are accessible electricity. There are 90% of household with electricity in Host community (D).

In terms of safety and security, over 90% of PAPs and Non-PAPs feel safety and security except PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A.

In terms of water resources, 88% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A bought water from relocation site. 59% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B used collective well from relocation site. Majority of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D) used private well. Collective well at relocation site is the major water source for New owners/renters.

In terms of preparation pattern for drinking water, Majority of PAPs from Zone A and B filter water before drinking. 75% of Host community (D) drink water directly without boiling and filtering.



5.11 Household Ownership

All of the Host Community (D), all of the PAPs living at the RS (A) and all of the Economically Displaced PAPs (C) report that they own their house (Figure 5.2 and Figure 5.3). A total of 10% of PAPs do not own their houses as they rent, live together with relatives or live in government housing if they are government staff.

5.12 Sanitation Facilities

Almost all of the respondents are using improved latrines/septic tank systems for their sanitation facilities. All Renters used improved latrines as they live in the RS where improved latrines are available. All host community households used improved latrines/septic tank systems. Some households of PAPs who have sold/rented out their house at the RS (B) use a traditional latrine. This depends on the facilities available in the location where they live. Only one respondent of PAPs that were economically displaced only (C) has no toilet.

Among the PAPs, all of those living at the RS (A) used improved latrine/septic tanks, compared with 95% for those PAPs who sold/rented a house at the RS (B) and 80% of PAPs that were Economically Displaced (C) but not relocated (Figure 5.5).




Figure 5-4 Type of Toilet Used by Respondents (Phase II)

5.13 Standing Water around House/Yard

A total of 80% of the host community and 27% of the renters/new owners have the problem with standing water/ flooding around their house (in their yards) after rain, while only 12% of PAPs have the problem (Figure 5.6). 15% of PAPs at the RS, 7% of PAPs who sold/rented at the RS (B) and 20% of PAPs economically displaced (C) have the problem of standing water/flooding around their house (Figure 5.7).




Figure 5-6 Household with Standing Water around House by respondents (Phase II)

5.14 Availability of Electricity

A total of 90% of the host community (D) and 93% of renters/new owners have access to electricity (Figure 5.8). All the PAPs at the RS (A) are supplied with electricity. A total of 81% of PAPs who sold/rented their house at the RS (B) and 80% of PAPs economically displaced (C) have access to electricity as some of them live in rural and semi-urban areas where there are shortages of electricity supply (they use candles and battery powered devices for energy and lighting).




Figure 5-8 Household with Electricity by Respondents (Phase II)

5.15 Sense of Security and Safety at Current House

The figures show that almost all respondents feel safe and secure at their current houses. All the host community, 97% of PAPs and 90% of renters/new owners feel safe/secure at their current houses (Figure 5.10). 95% of PAPs at the RS (A), 98% of PAPs who sold/rented at the RS (B) and all PAPs of economically displaced (C) feels safe/secure at their current houses (Figure 5.11).




Figure 5-10 Households feel safe and secure among respondents (Phase II)

5.16 Sources of Water

Most respondents use water for cooking and drinking from private well, collective wells and buying outside the RS (Figure 5.12). Around 70% of the Host Community (D) use private wells at their house/compound and 25% buy outside the RS. About 5% of the Host Community use water from the collective wells at the RS. 63% of Renters/New Owners at the RS use collective wells at the RS and 30% buy the water inside the RS.

Amongst all PAPs, 59% of PAPs at RS (A) use collective wells, 15% use private wells at the RS and 15% buy water inside the RS (Figure 5.13). A total of 10% of PAPs at RS (A) use water from outside the RS by buying and from the collective wells. Around 55% of PAPs who sold/rented at the RS (B) use private wells and 40% buy outside the RS.




Figure 5-12 Water Sources by Respondents (Phase II)

5.17 Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water

A total of 75% of the host community (D) drink directly and only 5% filter their water before drinking. Amongst all PAPs (A-C), 60% filter their water, 23% boil it before drinking and the rest 16% drink it directly. Around 50% of renters/new owners at the RS (E) filter their water, 13% boil it before drinking and the rest 37% drink it directly (Figure 5.14).

A total of 67% of PAPs at the RS (A) filter their water and 23% boil it before drinking, while the rest drink it directly. A total of 79% of PAPs who sold/rented a house at the RS (B) filter their water and 14% boil it before drinking, while the rest drink it directly. 40% of economically displaced PAPs (C) filter their water and only 20% boil it before drinking.

It is observed that most of the PAPs are used to filtering or boiling their water and very few people drink it directly. The PAPs at the RS (A) seem to be the most conscientious of their health with two thirds filtering water and one fourth boiling it before drinking.




Figure 5-14 Preparation of Patterns for Drinking Water by Respondents (Phase II)




Figure 5-15 Preparation Pattern for Drinking Water by PAPs (Phase II)

5.18 Perception of Living Conditions and Infrastructure at the Relocation Site

The RS residents were asked to describe their perception of housing, electricity, fly proof toilet, water availability, drainage, road condition and several other topics compared with the periods of External Monitoring Surveys.

The PAPs at the RS (A), as the fourth EMS for Zone A, have the positive perception of the water availability compared to 3rd EMS. A total of 54% of PAPs at the RS (A) report that they have better access to water, 46% feel the same unchanged the water availability compared to 3rd EMS and there is no negative perception at all.

A total of 85% of PAPs at the RS (A) report that road condition remains unchanged compared to the period of third EMS and 15% answered that road condition became worse compared to previous EMS (third EMS).

Majority of the PAPs at the RS respond that the house condition and toilet facility remain the same situation compared to 3rd EMS. Although around 20% of PAPs at the RS (A) perceived that there are some improvements for the house condition and toilet facility compared to previous EMS (3rd EMS), 15% of PAPs at the RS (A) mentions that house condition became worse and 8% of PAPs at the RS (A) mention that toilet facility became worse at the fourth EMS.

The table shows that Attendance at school, Dropout rates and Access to education facilities. 77% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A have school children, followed by 67% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and 65% of Host Community (D). The least school children of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and New renters/ owners at relocation site (E) are 20% and 27% respectively. There were no children above 5 years who don't attend school in PAPs economically displaced only (C), Host Community (D) and New renters/owners (E). Drop out rate of children was found in Host community (D) 31%, PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B 15% and PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A 5%. 100% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and New renters/ owners (E) had satisfaction upon their children's school. Over 60% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and Host community (D) reported that they were satisfied with their children's school.



When PAPs and Non-PAPs feel ill, over 60% of respondents go and consult with a doctor at health clinic. 19% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and 3% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B called a doctor to home. Some proportion of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and New owners/renters (E) were taken self-treatment. 58% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A suffered serious illness in past 12 months, followed by PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B (41%) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) (40%). There were 15% of Host community (D) and 17% of New owners/renters at relocation site affected serious illness 12 months ago.



Table 5-23 reveals the current environmental conditions reported by respondent categories (A-E) for Phase II and category A for Phase I. Noise problems mentioned by all respondent categories are quarrelling, loud sound from music box and drunkard. The percentages of PAPs at the RS (A) who reported noise problems are 12% at Phase I and 13% at Phase II, respectively. PAPs sold/rented out RS, PAPs economically displaced only and host community (D) have no noise problem while 20% of the new owners/renters reported the noise problems.

77% of PAPs at RS (A) at Zone A faced bad smell near their houses. 55% reported that bad smell came from the toilet, 25% from neighbor livestock, and 10% from drainage system. 7 PAPs at RS (A) at Zone B reported that they faced bad smell from toilet. Only 2

economically displaced households and 2 new owners/renters mentioned bad smell from neighbor livestock and rubbish bin.

97% of PAPs at RS (A) and the new owners/renters at Zone B disposed their garbage at the designated waste area and a total of 97% of PAPs at RS (A) at Zone A disposed their garbage with the garbage truck (12%) and to the designated waste area (85%). It is found that most of PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D) burnt their solid waste in the summer as there is no separated dumpling place for them, with the percentages of 60%, 80% and 50% respectively.

The table (5-24) shows the participation of PAPs from Zone A and B in vocational training. Based on the interest of PAPs, a different varieties of trainings were provided respective PAPs and their household members. They are electrical training, music training, driving training, sewing training, food processing training, mushroom planting training, agriculture training, construction training, workshop training and hair dressing training. 62% of household members from PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A attended vocational training. 8% of household members attended vocational training were found only in PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B. 23% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A reported that the trainings they received are helpful in finding a job. The reasons why these trainings did not help to find a job vary. Majority of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A mentioned that they did not complete the course. The other reasons responded by PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A are due to lack of appropriate jobs related with the training attended, still learning, family matters, lack of manpower to start a business and lack of driving license. Almost half of PAPs living at relocation site in Zone A and B and PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site reported that they are interested in further vocational trainings. It is found that 20% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) have interest in further vocational trainings.

The table (5-25 and -526) shows community communication and social activities done by respondent. Almost 100% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and B answered that social groups exist in their community while 50% of New owners/renters (E) who are also living at relocation site responded that social groups exist in their community. PAPs and Non-PAPs mainly received government information and social activities information through 100 households head/10 households head and village administrators.

The table (5-27) shows community problem-solving and social relationships of respondents. Regarding the issues which cannot solved within family, 100 households head/10 households head, village administrator and other governmental officials are major consultation channels made by PAPs and Non-PAPs. 54% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A revealed that they usually consult with 100 households head/10 households head. 41% of

PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B reported that they consult with 100 households head/10 households head. It is found that 74% of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B) and 60% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) did not made any consultation with anyone else on the issues they faced. As for Host community (D), they mainly used 100 households head/10 households head and village administer as consultation network. 50% of New owners/renters (E) ask for help to 100 households head/10 households head for the matters of solving community problems. All of PAPs and Non-PAPs have social relationships with neighboring households except a small percentage of New owners/renters (E).

6 Conclusion and Recommendations

6.1 Conclusion - Major Findings

Employment

It is found that household head's job changes of people living at relocation site (A) from Zone A increased to 23% although these changes have dramatically reduced from 41% to 10% during the period of after the first EMS and after the second EMS. As Displacement disrupts traditional livelihood system of project affected people, their livelihood systems have been transformed. It can be said that livelihood system of people living at relocation site (A) from Zone A is still unstable and weaken due to the growing number of their household head's job changes.

High dependency ratio of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and Zone B shows that number of employed people is less than that of unemployed people although they have bigger family size than other different types of PAPs and non-PAPs. The burden falls to unbalance of income and expenditure. PAPs economically displaced only (C) has the least dependency ratio among them.

Income and Expenditure

Monthly average income of different categories of PAPs (A-C) from Zone B, Host community (D) and New owners/renters (E) exceeds their monthly average expenditure. Monthly average expenditure of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A outweighs their monthly average income. It tends to disadvantage them, resulting in high level of indebtedness. Unbalance of income and expenditure is also a key link in the chain of debt.

Indebtedness

The data shows that 59% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B are left in situations where there is a range of debt between 10,000,000 and 70,000 MMK. High percentage of borrowing money and higher level of indebtedness is found in those PAPs who are living at relocation site (A) from Zone A, PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and PAPs sold/rented house at RS (B) from Zone B who have higher dependency ratio.

On the other hand, lower percentage of borrowing money and lower indebtedness level can be seen in PAPs economically displaced only (C) from Zone B, Host community (D) and New owners/renters at RS (E) who have lower dependency ratio. Therefore, high level of indebtedness is indirect consequences of traditional livelihood disruption, unemployment, poor financial management and unbalance of income and expenditure.

Savings

Less than 50 % of PAPs and Non-PAPs' households have saving practice. Their saving practice is also different. 69% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A are credit group members and save their money in microfinance. Only 10% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B are credit group members and majority of households (40%) save their money at either bank or home. It can be said that microfinance activity is not functioning well for PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B.

Current Environmental Condition

In terms of current environmental conditions at relocation site, some PAPs living at relocation site still reported bad toilet conditions because of being overflow and this is likely to harm their health in the long run. It is said that water is in good quality and water meter will be equipped and its charges will be paid later. If the charges are quite high for the big family members, they said that they will have to negotiate it with zone committee. There is no complaint about electricity supply bill.

They revealed the waste disposal inasmuch as four garbage bins are not adequate for 90 houses. Roads of the relocation site are better than those of previous places. However, these roads are not good to walk and ride motorbikes. Unless the roads of relocation site turn to concrete ones, they will not be convenient.

Some houses reported that there are noise issues coming from music box. Some reported the security issue and they are afraid of theft because of stolen motorbikes.

Income Restoration Program

It is found that a few PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B participated in vocational trainings. PAPs sold/rented houses at RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) were not found in attending any vocational trainings. As part of income restoration program, delivery of vocational trainings is the biggest role in restoring their income and livelihoods in the aftermath of displacement as traditional economies and social networks of PAPs are eroded and they are vulnerable to adopt coping strategies.

6.2 Recommendations

It is recommended that there is a need to focus on employment opportunity creation to PAPs to enable for covering their basic needs of living and reducing dependency ratio.

It is advisable for all PAPs from Zone B to introduce microfinance program to adjust income and expenditure.

Provision of vocational trainings with market potential would be beneficial for their capacity building and livelihood.
