1 Introduction

1.1 Background of Thilawa Special Economic Zone (SEZ)

Since November 2011, the Myanmar Government has been planning economic restructuring from the current structure that mainly depends on agriculture, forestry, and fisheries, to a new structure that focuses on labor-intensive industries such as manufacturing and services. To boost such economic restructuring it has been proposed to attract direct investment and market entry by companies from developed countries that have important resources such as technology, capital, management skills, and sales skills. The Myanmar government has placed a priority on attracting Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in order to achieve economic




Figure 1-1 Location of Thilawa SEZ Development Area


development. As such, three Special Economic Zones (SEZs) have been earmarked for development; these are in Thilawa, Dawei, and Kyaukphyu.

Thilawa SEZ is located in Yangon Region about 20 km on the southeast side of Yangon city. The Thilawa SEZ covers an area of about 2,400 ha alongside the Thilawa Port. Thilawa SEZ lands for factories near Yangon, to promote the country's industrialization as well as generate jobs for Myanmar people. This project is expected to support sustainable economic development for Myanmar, contributing to improved living standards for its people and the development of industries that can meet rising domestic demand.

The land use plan for the entire development area of Thilawa SEZ has been prepared based on the above development concept. The Phase 1 area of about 400 ha (Phase I area) has been selected as a priority development. This Phase 1 area was planned to be developed as a base for significant investment from foreign and domestic companies, supporting the country's industrialization. Myanmar Japan Thilawa Development Ltd.

(MJTD) is a joint venture between the Myanmar and Japanese governments and companies from both countries.

Development Plan of Zone B Area: As part of the 2000ha Development Area, the development plan of approximately 700 ha is now being formulated as Phase 2 / Zone B (the Zone B Development Area). The Zone B Development Area consists of approximately 262 ha of Industrial Area, 267 ha of Logistic Area and 169 ha of Residence & Commercial Area as shown in Figure 1-3. Environmental Impact Assessment



(EIA) study on the Zone B Development Area was also conducted in parallel with planning. Approximately 100 ha out of 262 ha was identified as the Initial Development Area of the Industrial Area (Area 2-1), while the remaining approximately 162 ha is also planned to be developed as the Second Development Area (Area 2-2)2. Accordingly, the RWP was prepared for Area 2-1 in August 2016, and the RWP is being prepared for the remaining area as the Second Development Area (Area 2-2) in Area 2 separately based on the contents stipulated in the Framework prepared by TSMC in February 2016.

1.2 Management of the Thilawa SEZ Resettlement Program

The Yangon Region Government (YRG) is the responsible body for implementation of the Resettlement Work Plan (RWP) that was prepared for the Phase 1 area. Two sub-committees have also been established, chaired by the Administrators of General Administration Departments (GADs) of Thanlyin and Kyauktan Townships. One sub-committee is Relocation Implementation Sub-Committee (RISC), which deals with disbursement of monetary assistance and the arrangement of living conditions at the relocation site (RS). The other sub-committee is Income Restoration Program Implementation Sub-Committee (IRPSC), which manages the implementation of the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The Thilawa SEZ Management Committee (TSEZMC) is a cooperative agency, supporting YRG, RISC and IRPSC in the smooth implementation of the RWP including the IRP. The responsibility of TSEZMC is: "to cooperate with YRG, RISC and IRPISC to support for resettlement works as needed, such as schedule management of relocation and development of SEZ area and facilitation of the job recruitment of project affected persons (PAPs) in the SEZ area" in accordance with [Pg III.28, Interim Report on Technical Assistance for Preparation of Resettlement Work Plan in Myanmar].

1.3 Thilawa Phase 1 Resettlement and Income Restoration Program

1.3.1 Phase 1 Resettlement Program

From 4 to 26 April 2013, a socio-economic census (April Census) of all households living inside the Thilawa SEZ development area (approximately 2,400 ha) was conducted. A Detailed Measurement Survey (DMS) then followed to supplement the April Census and confirm the physical and productive assets of PAPs. The DMS was conducted between June and August 2013 while the final Phase 1 boundary was determined in early July 2013. At that time the PAPs of the Phase 1 area were identified and Cut-off Date for eligibility was set as 4 April 2013. Based on the DMS, the PAPs for the Phase 1 area were broadly divided into the following three categories.

- **A.** Living inside Phase 1 area (relocation required);
- **B.** Living outside Phase 1 area (but inside SEZ area) & Cultivating Inside Phase 1 area; and
- C. Living outside Phase 1 area (and outside SEZ area) & Cultivating Inside Phase 1 area.

As at the end of September 2013, a total of 81 households were regarded as eligible PAPs for the Phase I area and these households have a total population of 382 persons. Of the 81 households, 28 households cultivated farmland, covering a total of approximately 202 acres,

inside the Phase 1 area. The other PAPs were mostly participating in casual labour/odd jobs, some livestock production and small enterprises.

As described in the RWP, the loss of house was assisted by providing a substitute house at the RS or the equivalent money to cover house construction costs for those who prefer to construct their own house at the RS. Monetary assistance was also provided for losses of other fixed assets (livestock barns), large livestock (buffalo and cow) and agriculture machines. Loss of means of livelihood for land-based and non-land-based income sources was assisted with monetary assistance for improving or restoring livelihoods to at least preproject level. As for land-based income sources, monetary assistance was calculated based on crop yield by referring to national regulations. As for non-land-based income sources, monetary assistance was paid in the form of an allowance of wages for the period of disrupting income-generating activities due to relocation. In addition to assistance for loss of assets and income sources, monetary assistance for moving, commuting and cooperation for relocation was provided to enhance smooth relocation and to support commuting after relocation.

Assistance for vulnerable groups was provided since relocation affects vulnerable groups more severely than others. The project defines as vulnerable a household headed by a woman, disabled person or an elderly person (over 61 years old), a household including a disabled person or a household below the poverty line.

1.3.2 Phase 1 Income Restoration Program (IRP)

Households living in or engaged in income generating activities inside the Phase I area whose livelihoods were affected due to implementation of the Phase 1 project are eligible to participate in the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The IRP is in-kind assistance provided to PAPs in order to restore and stabilise their livelihoods and income sources. The IRP focuses on diversified economic activities for PAPs to generate income for three years after resettlement, to enable them to cover their basic needs after relocation. In order to restore their livelihoods, the development of Phase 1 is providing PAPs with an assistance package through the IRP, which includes vocational training and other support measures.

The IRP aims to assist PAPs to have job opportunities in/around Thilawa SEZ and to be engaged in small-scale businesses. The IRP is being provided to all PAPs including the following (as per RWP):

- a) Farmers who need to change from farming to another income earning activity;
- b) Daily casual workers and other off-farm workers who want to change job location;
- c) Unemployed people who want to improve their technical skills to find a job; and
- d) PAPs that do not need to change their current income earning activities but want to improve their technical skills and/or income level.

The IRP was initiated in December 2013 with participatory workshop with PAPs for needs survey. Based on the result of needs survey at the participatory workshop, vocational training and infrastructure improvement have been conducted as well as social-welfare support, such as official procedure support for obtaining identity card and school transfer to new school near the relocation site.

1.4 Thilawa Phase 2 Resettlement and Income Restoration Program

1.4.1 Phase 2 Resettlement Program

From 4 to 26 April 2013 (April Census), field surveys were conducted for census and socio-economic information for all of households living inside the Thilawa SEZ Development Area. DMS was conducted to supplement information collected in the April Census and to confirm assets of PAHs/PAPs during May 2014 and October 2015 for the 2000ha Development Area. An additional DMS was carried out in December 2016 for households who were not surveyed in DMS. According to DMS, the number of PAHs and PAPs to be affected by the development of Area 2-2 East are 99 and 387, respectively as of December 2016. PAHs have been divided into five groups (A to E) depending on the types of impacts as per DMS. Cut-off date (COD) is the day to determine eligibility for entitlement of compensation and/or assistance. Persons (or households) living or performing income generation activities inside the area of Thilawa SEZ on COD are eligible for compensation and/or assistance package. The principles of eligibility for the compensation and/or assistance package are shown below:

- (1) Households living inside the Second Development Area (Area 2-2 East) on the day of COD.
- (2) Households occupying some area inside the Second Development Area (Area 2-2 East) on the day of COD by doing income generation activities or holding structures though living outside the Initial Development Area.
- (3) Households whose land is under the official land acquisition procedure.

Actually, IRP is proposed to be composed of two main components: Component-1: as for all PAPs, support for restoration of economic conditions through a combination of activities for enhancement of income earning opportunities and household account management, Component-2: as for PAPs who are resettled to new place, support for adapting environmental and social living conditions through community development

As described in the RWP, the loss of house was assisted by providing a substitute house at the RS or the equivalent money to cover house construction costs for those who prefer to construct their own house at the RS. Monetary assistance was also provided for losses of other fixed assets (livestock barns), large livestock (buffalo and cow) and agriculture machines. Loss of means of livelihood for land-based and non-land-based income sources was assisted with monetary assistance for improving or restoring livelihoods to at least preproject level. As for land-based income sources, monetary assistance was calculated based on crop yield by referring to national regulations. As for non-land-based income sources, monetary assistance was paid in the form of an allowance of wages for the period of disrupting income generating activities due to relocation. In addition to assistance for loss of assets and income sources, monetary assistance for moving, commuting and cooperation for relocation was provided to enhance smooth relocation and to support commuting after relocation.

Assistance for vulnerable groups was provided since relocation affects vulnerable groups more severely than others. The project defines as vulnerable a household headed by a

woman, disabled person or an elderly person (over 61 years old), a household including a disabled person or a household below the poverty line.

1.4.2 Phase 2 Income Restoration Program (IRP)

The IRP is in-kind assistance provided to PAPs in order to restore and stabilise their livelihoods and income sources. In order to restore their livelihoods, the development of Phase 2 is providing PAPs with an assistance package through the IRP, which includes vocational training and other support measures.

The IRP aims to assist PAPs to have job opportunities in/around Thilawa SEZ and to be engaged in small-scale businesses. The IRP is being provided to all PAPs including the following (as per RWP):

- a) Farmers who need to change from farming to another income earning activity;
- b) Daily casual workers and other off-farm workers who want to change job location;
- c) Unemployed people who want to improve their technical skills to find a job; and
- d) PAPs that do not need to change their current income earning activities but want to improve their technical skills and/or income level.

2 Objectives of the External Monitoring

Monitoring and evaluation of the progress of the resettlement works and IRP is conducted by independent third party, focusing on PAPs of the Phase 1 and 2 areas only (where resettlement has already occurred). The objectives of the 1rd external monitoring for Phase 2 are to:

- To monitor the changes of socio-economic conditions of PAPs during the interval period
- To monitor the progress of resettlement works for PAPs
- To provide recommendations in the implementation of RWP and IRP to improve effectiveness

3 Scope of the Monitoring

3.1 Work Period

Data collection for socio-economic survey started on 7th October 2018 and ended on 15th October 2018(working days 9). After conducting the survey, data entry was conducted and completed on 23rd October 2018(working days 6). Data cleaning started on 24th October to ended on 31st October (working days 5) and data analysis finished on 18th November 2018(working days 12). The first draft report was submitted on 6th December 2018. The

report will be finalized by the end of December 2018 after incorporating comments from JICA Expert Team.

3.2 Methodology Used and Sources of Information

- ✓ Document review
- ✓ Socioeconomic survey for Project Affected Households. The household questionnaires used for this External Monitoring are included in Annexes 2 to 6.
- ✓ One focus group discussion with micro-finance committee
- ✓ Observation on project sites

3.3 Impact Monitoring of the RWP Implementation

To see the impact of the RWP implementation, the socioeconomic survey was conducted to see any changes in PAP's livelihood. The survey parameters of the socioeconomic survey were designed to obtain data and information on a range of specific issues as follows: the conditions of the RS and housing and infrastructure; settlement at the RS; restoration/re-establishment of livelihoods and living standards; the effectiveness, impact and sustainability of entitlements and the IRP; and the potential need for further improvements. The parameters chosen were organized in the survey questionnaires in the following themes:

- Demography;
- Livelihoods, Income and Expenditure;
- Housing and Infrastructure at RS;
- Ownership of Assets;
- Education and Health Care:
- Environmental Conditions: and
- Communications, Social Networks and Social Cohesion.

A series of open and closed questions were included in the household questionnaire under each of these key themes. As described above, these were tailored for the different groups targeted in the survey. The questionnaire forms for the socio-economic survey are attached in Annex 2-6.

3.4 Targeted Groups for Monitoring

A number of different categories of PAPs were targeted for the monitoring survey as well as members of the Host Community at Myaing Tharyar and PAPs living at relocation site (A) Zone A, Phase I for a comparison with the resettled/displaced population. It was also important to obtain data from new residents at the RS, including those who have rented or purchased houses from PAPs. The following table lists the different categories of people targeted for the survey, the number of households targeted in each group and the number actually surveyed.

4 Process of Monitoring

Existing Data Review and Preparation of the Field Activities (Site Visits, Socio-economic Survey) TWA reviewed and examined the profile of the PAPs and also reviewed progress reports such as the RWP and IRP documentations prepared by JICA expert team. TWA then mobilized a survey team comprised of surveyors in **December 2017**. TWA provided two-day training to the surveyors on the objective of the survey, the meanings of the survey questionnaires, the responsibility and role of the surveyors, and data collection and data entry procedures.

4.1 Additional Data Collection and Data Entry

The field survey of the Socio-economic survey started on 7th October 2018 and ended on 15th October 2018. The surveyors explained the questionnaires to the survey respondents and collected the data, and checked all the data not to be missed in the questionnaire forms in the field. After the data gathering process, the data was processed in parallel to data cleaning. The data input was then cross-checked again to ensure the relevance to the information sought through the questionnaires.

4.2 Data Analysis

Data was processed and analysed in Microsoft Excel through the following steps by data analyst and surveyors <u>during November 2018</u>. Cleaned the data and entered it into an excel file:

- Listed tables and charts inferred from the baseline and current data:
- Summarized the data collected;
- Finalized the results of the survey; and
- Created charts and tables to display the survey results; and interpreted the charts and tables.

4.4 Limitations

This external monitoring report/evaluation is mainly based on interactions with PAPs through the socio-economic survey and review of the existing monitoring documents and other resettlement-related records by the external monitoring consultants. This evaluation is not a review of the RWP against international standards, and no assessment has been made about whether or not the RWP is fit-for-purpose in accordance with the relevant standards.

5 Results of Socio-economic Survey of the Project Affected Persons

5.1 Demography

The table (5.1-1) divides the household characteristics of project-affected people into Zone A (Phase I) and Zone B (Phase II). Comparison was made among PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A (Phase I) and PAPs living at the relocation site (A), PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) in Zone B (Phase II), Host community (D) and New owners/renters (E).

70% of New owners/renters (E) were between the age of 18 and 60, followed by 68% of Host community (D), 62% of PAPs economically displaced only (C), 62% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B), 61% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, 52% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A. If compared Group A of Phase I and Group A of Phase II, their demography namely gender ratio, age group and household size were not much different. Gender ratio was nearly 1:1 except PAPs economically displaced only (0.7) and Host community (0.8). There were altogether 11 disabled people including 2 people from Zone A PAPs 7 people from Zone B PAPs (A-C) and 2 people from Host Community (D) at the 5th EMS. Family size of each PAP household ranged from 4 to 5. Dependency ratio was 1 to 2 for all household categories (A-E). The highest dependency ratio (2.3) was found in PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, followed by

dependency ratio (1.9) of PAPs living in RS (A) from Zone B and dependency ratio (1.6) of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation (B) from Zone B while the rest categories of the respondents had almost the same of dependency ratio about 1. Gender ratio of respondents' categories from Phase I and II were generally the same and their household size was nearly the same between 4 and 5 except new owners/ renters at the relocation site (E) who had relatively small number of family size (2.7).

5.2 Changes in Job for Household Heads

Each PAP at the relocation site (A) from Zone A was asked to indicate whether or not their Household Heads have changed their job compared to the 4th external monitoring survey (EMS). The data showed that Household heads' job of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A remained the same percentage (23%) as the 4th EMS. Job changes of household heads were stable after the 3rd and the 4th EMS.

5.3 Location of Work

Table (5.3-1) describes the locations of work commuted by different types of respondents. Majority of the respondents except PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D) worked inside SEZ, representing 44% of New owners/renters at the relocation site (E), followed by 40% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, 34% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and 32% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A. PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D) worked mostly in Kyauntan. Less than 10% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B and PAPs sold/rented a house at the relocation site (B) and were working in Yangon.

5.4 Transportation to Work

Means of transportation to work for all PAPs and non-PAPs were on foot, motorbike, bicycle, motorbike taxi, ferry bus and public transport.

Few people from PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and Host community (D) went on foot to work. Of different modes of transportation to work, motorbike was highly used for almost all different types of respondents except PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B.It is found that 40% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B and 35% of New owners/ renters (E), who were engaged in garment factories, took a ferry bus which was a kind of transportation arrangement from these factories. It can be seen that respondents' travel to work by using different means of transportation based on their location of work.

5.5 Household Income and Expenditure

The table (5.5-1) shows average monthly and annual household income of all types of respondents from Zone A Phase I, Zone B Phase II, Host community (D) and New owners/renters (E).

PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) monthly earned 495,186 MMK and 461,994 MMK respectively. The monthly income of Host community (D) was 330,263 MMK and that of New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) 372,525 MMK. There were no much differences between monthly income of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B as their earnings were 254,327 MMK and 269,694 MMK respectively.

The table (5.5-2) describes the comparison of monthly and annual income of PAPs (A-C) from Zone B Phase II at the periods of the before resettlement, the 1st EMS and the 2nd EMS. Fluctuation of average annual income was seen in PAPs living at relocation site (A) and PAPs economically displaced only (C). Although average annual income of PAPs living at relocation site (A) significantly increased at the 1st EMS compared with before resettlement, their annual incomes have dropped at the 2nd EMS. The table (5.5-3) shows per capita net income of different types of respondents annually and monthly. Per capita monthly income of PAPs sold/rented out a house at relocation site (B) and that of PAPs economically displaced only (C) were almost the same as 116,995 MMK and 115,486 MMK respectively. Both earnings of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and Zone B were relatively low. Per capita net income of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A was 50,095 MMK and that of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B was 61,841 MMK.

The table (5.5-5) mentions primary income sources of the respondents. Common income sources were wage-work, odd job and home business. Less than 5% of PAPs at relocation site

(A) from Zone B and PAPs rented/sold out a house at the relocation site (B) worked as government staff.

50% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A worked in wage work, followed by 31% in home business and 15% in odd jobs. In Zone B, PAPs living at relocation site (A) were mostly engaged in wage-work (58%), followed by home business (17%) and odd jobs (14%). No one from PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B were not living on crops sale.

It is found that wage work was the major income source for 80% of New owners/renters at the relocation site (E), 58% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, 53% of Host community (D), 50% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, 49% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and 39% of PAPs economically displaced only (C). The table (5.5-6) shows that comparison of primary income sources by PAPs (A-C) from Zone B for the periods of before resettlement, the 1st EMS and the 2nd EMS. Before resettlement, their major income sources came from wage work for PAPs living at the relocation site (A), rice farming for PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B)

and home business for PAPs economically displaced only (C) respectively. More and more PAPs (A-C) have been engaged in wage work after resettlement.

At the 2nd EMS, income sources from rice farming were not found at all. PAPs at the relocation site (A) and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) were more engaged in wage work while PAPs economically displaced only (C) were less engaged in wage work. On the other hand, decreasing a large number of people who worked in odd jobs was found in PAPs at the relocation site (A) and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B). Although PAPs economically displaced only (C) worked for more home business, PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) were less engaged in home business activities. It is also found that the number of jobless PAPs (A-C) decreased at the 2nd EMS compared with before resettlement.

The table (5.5-7) describes secondary income sources of PAPs and Non-PAPs. It is found that 69% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, 65% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, 50% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and 33% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) did not have secondary income source. As for majority of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and those of Host

community (D), their secondary income source was wage work. PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and PAPs economically displaced only (C) were more engaged in home business activities as their secondary income sources. 11% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B worked in odd job as their secondary income source.

Income sources are vital for their livelihood survival. It is suggested that investment advice should come together with compensation for their long-term survival so that they can cope with new environment.

The table shows the average monthly and annual expenditure of PAPs and Non-PAPs. Monthly expenditure of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B was 407,275 MMK which was the highest spending among the respondents, followed by PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation (B) and PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A. It is found that PAPs economically displaced only (C) spent 311,133 MMK monthly which was the least spending on expenditure among the respondents.

The table 5.5-9 shows the average monthly and annual expenditures of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A to reveal comparisons among before resettlement, 1st EMS, 2nd EMS, 3rd EMS, 4th EMS and 5th EMS. After resettlement, the average expenditure of PAPs living at the relocation (A) rose up to double at the 1st EMS. But their spending on expenditure gradually dropped till the 3rd EMS and it went up again at the 4th EMS. There was also a slight increase in their expenditure at the 5th EMS which was the highest throughout five consecutive EMSs.

Table (5.5-10) shows the comparison of average annual and monthly expenditure of PAPs (A-C) from Zone B during the periods of before resettlement, the 1^{st} EMS and the 2^{nd} EMS. Before resettlement, monthly expenditures of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) were significantly high compared with the 1^{st} EMS and 2^{nd} EMS while that of PAPs economically displaced only (C) was nearly the same amount of the 1^{st} EMS and a small amount of the spending decreased at the 2^{nd} EMS.

The average annual expenditure of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) got higher from 4,590,908 MMK to 4,887,305 MMK at the 2nd EMS compared with the 1st EMS. But On the other hand, the average annual expenditure of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and that of PAPs economically displaced only (C) slightly decreased from 4,841,286 MMK to 4,821,516 MMK and from 4,344,000 MMK to 3,733,600 MMK respectively.

The table (5.5-11) shows the average of food and non-food expenditure annually consumed by PAPs from Zone A/B and Non-PAPs. Except New owners/renters (E), all types of respondents spent more on food expenditure than non-food expenditure. The annual food expenditure of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) was the highest (2,841,851 MMK), followed by PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B (2,651,883 MMK), Host Community (D) (2,504,211 MMK), PAPs economically displaced only (C) (2,446267 MMK), PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A (2,388,138 MMK) and New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) (1,877,780 MMK).

The annual spending on non-food expenditure of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A was 2,254,200 MMK which was the highest amount among different types of PAPs while that of PAPs economically displaced only (C) was 1,287,333 MMK which was the lowest amount.

The table (5.5-12) describes the annual average food expenditure and non-food expenditure of PAPs (A-C) from Zone B Phase II. Before resettlement, the annual average amount of non-food expenditure was significantly higher than that of food expenditure for all PAPs (A-C). It was found that there was a significant drop in their spending on non-food expenditures especially in PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) after resettlement. At the 1st EMS, a large amount of food expenditure was spent by all PAPs (A-C) compared with before resettlement.

At the 2nd EMS, the annual average food and non-food expenditures of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) became higher compared with the 1st EMS while those of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and that of PAPs economically displaced only (C) went down.

5.6 Savings

Saving patterns by all categories of respondents were saving at home/bank, microfinance, investing in business and purchasing livestock. Only one PAP could save money through microfinance introduced by the monk at the relocation site (A) from Zone A. All different categories of PAPs from Zone B and New owners/ renters at the relocation site (E) did not have microfinance program, except Host community (D). New Owners/ Renters at the relocation site (E) were the highest percentage of saving households (47%), followed by 39% of PAPs economically displaced only (C). 6% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A had savings and 4% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B had savings. Their savings were mostly kept at a bank or at home. In terms of credit group membership, none of New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) were members of a credit group. Microfinance was found only in PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and Host Community (D). This indicates that PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B and New owners/renters at the relocation site (E), which was a relatively new settlement, were not yet accessing microfinance programs.



5.7 Debt and Indebtedness

The table (5.7-1) shows that indebtedness of respondents in Phase I and II. The minimum and maximum range of debt level varied among all types of PAPs and Non-PAPs. The minimum debt was the range between 50,000 MMK and 200,000 MMK and the maximum debt was the range of between 2,000,000 MMK and 7,000,000 MMK.

58% of Host community borrowed money, followed by 44% of PAP sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B), 42% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B, 35% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and 22% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) respectively.

It is found that the debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B was the highest (7,000,000 MMK). PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) followed the second highest level of being indebtedness (3,000,000 MMK). Maximum debt range of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A was 2,850,000 MMK.

The table (5.7-2) shows the debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A only during the period of four consecutive external monitoring surveys. The percentage of households borrowed money has dramatically reduced during the period of 2nd EMS and 3rd EMS. But it is found that there was a significant increase in the percentage of households with debt at the 4th EMS while there was a significant decrease in the percentage of households with debt at the 5th EMS.

At the 5th EMS, the debt percentage of PAPs at the relocation site (A) relatively dropped to the lowest percentage (35%). Maximum and minimum debt range of the 5th EMS became narrow between 2,850,000 MMK and 100,000 MMK compared to that of the 4th EMS between 9,000,000 MMK and 500,000 MMK.

5.8 Food Security

The table (5.8-1) shows food shortage of different respondents' categories in 12 months ago. Food shortage occurred to PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A, PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site from Zone B. The percentage of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) who had food shortage in past 12 months was the highest among all the respondents, followed by 11% of Host Community (D) and 8% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B. There was no food shortage for PAPs economically displaced only (C) and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B). It is found that there were 9 households with food shortage in total.

The table (5.8-2) describes the food shortage of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A during the fifth consecutive periods of external monitoring surveys. Of external monitoring surveys, 36% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A with food shortage was the highest and it happened at the 2nd EMS. 5.9 Ownership of Moveable Assets

The table (5.9-1) shows that different types of moveable assets owned by PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B. There were three types of moveable assets. Electric fan, fridge, inverter, small generator and TV were included in moveable asset type 1. Bicycle, motorbike, gondong (handy tractor) and tractor belonged to moveable asset type 2. Phone, water pump, sewing machine, solar, battery, radio and washing machine were in moveable asset type 3.

The majority of moveable asset types owned by all different respondents' categories of PAPs were TV, motorbike and phone. It is found that PAPs economically displaced only (C) were the least users for any moveable asset types while PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) were the highest users for every moveable asset type.

5.10 Housing and Infrastructure

The table (5.10-1) shows the conditions of household ownership, toilet types, water standing, electricity, safety and security, water sources and drinking water of PAPs from Zone A/B and

Non-PAPs. In terms of household ownership of respondents, all PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B owned their houses. 93% of PAPs sold/rented out at RS (B) from Zone B and 95% of host community (D) also owned their houses.

In terms of toilet types used by the respondents, majority of PAPs and Non-PAPs used improved latrine/septic tanks.

In terms of water standing around houses, 27% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A experienced water standing, followed by 21% of Host community (D), 17% each of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B and New owners/renters (E).

In terms of electricity supply, 100% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A/B and Host community (D) had electricity supply. 84% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at relocation site (B) and 94% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) were accessible electricity supply.

In terms of safety and security, about 90% of all respondents PAPs and Non-PAPs felt safety and security. The table (5.10-1) shows that majority of the respondents felt safe and secure at their current houses. 88% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, 89% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B and 87% of New owners/renter at the relocation site (E) perceived that they had safety and security at their current houses. It is said that 98% of PAPs who sold/rented a house at the relocation site (B) and all PAPs economically displaced only (C) felt safe/secure at their current houses.

In terms of water sources, majority of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B bought water from relocation site. Private Wells were used by majority of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D).

In terms of preparation pattern for drinking water, 100% of Host community (D) filtered water before drinking. More than 90% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B filtered water before drinking while less than 10% had the practice of boiling water before drinking.



5.11 Household Ownership


Figure 5.11-1 Household Ownership of Respondent (Phase II)

The figure 5.11-1 shows that 90% of PAPs from Zone B owned their houses. Non-PAPs living at the relocation site were occupied as new owners (7%) and renters (93%).

5.12 Sanitation Facilities

In terms of toilet types used by respondents, majority of PAPs and Non-PAPs use improved latrine/septic tanks. Almost all of the respondents are using improved latrines/septic tank systems for their sanitation facilities. All renters use improved latrines as they live in the RS where improved latrines are available. All host community households used improved latrines/septic tank systems. Some households of only economically displaced use a traditional latrine (Figure 5.12-2). This depends on the facilities available in the location where they live.




Figure 5.12-1 Type of Toilet Used by Respondents (Phase II)




Figure 5.12-2 Type of Toilet Used by PAPs (Phase II)

5.13 Standing Water around House/Yard

The figure 5.13 shows the percentages of households with standing water around house. 17% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B responded that there were standing water around their houses followed by 12% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and 6% of PAPs economically displaced only (C). 21% of Host Community (D) also experienced standing water around their houses.




Figure 5.13-2 Household with Standing Water around House among PAPs (Phase II)

5.14 Availability of Electricity




Figure 5.14-2 Household with Electricity among PAPs (Phase II)

The figures 5.14-1 and 5.14-2 show the availability of electricity by the households of PAPs and Non-PAPs. Some PAPs economically displaced only (C) live in rural and semi-urban areas where there are shortages of electricity supply (they use candles and battery powered devices for energy and lighting).

100% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and Host community (D) are available electricity supply. 84% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at relocation site (B) and 94% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) are accessible electricity supply.

5.15 Sense of Security and Safety at Current House

The figure (5.15-1) shows that 89% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, 98% of PAPs sold/rented a house at the relocation site (B) and 100% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) felt safe/secure at their current houses.

5.16 Sources of Water




Figure 5.16-1 Water Sources for Drinking by Respondents (Phase II)

Most respondents used water for drinking from private well and bought drinking water outside the relocation site (Figure 5.16-1). Around 68% of the Host Community (D) used private wells at their house/compound and 21% bought drinking water outside the relocation site. 57% of renters/new owners at the relocation site (E) bought the water outside relocation site and 20% bought the water inside the relocation site.

Amongst all PAPs, 56% of PAPs at relocation site (A) from Zone B bought drinking water inside the relocation site, 25% purchased the water outside the relocation site and 11% used rain water for drinking (Figure 5.16-2). Around 49% of PAPs who sold/rented at the relocation site (B) used the water from private wells, 16% bought the water outside the relocation site, 12% purchased it from relocation site and 12% from other sources. 28% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) used rain water for drinking, followed by 22% each from private wells and buying outside relocation site.




Figure 5.16-3 Water Sources for Home Use by Respondents (Phase II)

Most respondents used water for home use from private wells and bought from the relocation site (Figure 5.16-3). For home purpose, 74% of the Host Community (D) used the water from private wells at their house/compound and 21% bought it outside the relocation site. 80% of renters/new owners at the relocation site (E) bought the water from the relocation site.

Amongst the PAPs at relocation site, for home use, 75% of PAPs at relocation site (A) from Zone B bought the water at the relocation site and 19% used the collective wells at the relocation site. Around 65% of PAPs who sold and/or rented a house at the relocation site (B) and 56% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) collected the water from private wells.

5.17 Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water




Figure 5.17-1 Preparation of Patterns for Drinking Water by Respondents (Phase II)

All of the Host community filtered their water before drinking. Compared to the previous monitoring, 75% of the Host community (D) drunk water directly and only 5% filtered their water before drinking. Amongst all PAPs (A-C), 74% filtered their water, 12% boiled it before drinking and the rest 6% drunk it without boiling and filtering. Around 57% of New renters/owners at the relocation site (E) filtered their water, 20% boiled it before drinking and the rest 23% drunk it directly (Figure 5.17-1). 94% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B filtered their water and only 3% boiled it before drinking and 3% drunk it directly. 77% of PAPs who sold and/or rented a house at the relocation site (B) filtered their water and 16% boiled it before drinking, while the rest (7%) drunk it directly. 61% of PAP economically displaced (C) filtered their water and only 28% boiled it before drinking while the rest (11%) drunk directly.

It is observed that the percentage of all respondents who used to filter or boil their water became higher and less respondents drunk their water directly without boiling or filtering compared to the 4th EMS. It is obviously seen that majority of respondents became conscientious of their health by sharing the information among them.




Figure 5.17-2 Preparation Pattern for Drinking Water by PAPs (Phase II)

5.18 Perception of Living Conditions and Infrastructure at the Relocation Site

The figure 5.18-1 shows the living conditions and infrastructure at the relocation site perceived by PAPs living at RS (A) from Zone A. They were asked to describe their perception on the conditions of house, toilet facilities, water availability and road conditions to compare with the periods of External Monitoring Surveys.

In the 5th EMS, most of the PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A had the positive perception of the water availability. Only 4% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A reported that they had better access to water while 96% felt the same condition of water availability compared to the 4th EMS and there is no negative perception at all.

A total of 31% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) reported that road condition remained unchanged compared to the periods of 4^{th} EMS and 69% answered that road condition became worse compared to previous EMS.

Majority of the PAPs at the relocation site (A) responded that house condition (77%) and toilet facility (73%) remained the same situation compared to the 4th EMS. 19% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) mentioned that house condition became worse. 27% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) mentioned that toilet facility became worse at the 5th EMS. Only 4% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) perceived that there were some improvements in access to water. 69% of PAPs at the relocation site (A) complained that the road condition got worse than the 4th EMS and no one mentioned better improvement in road condition.

5.19 Education and Health Facility

The table (5.19-1) shows that attendance at school, dropout rates and access to education facilities by respondents. 81% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A had school children, followed by 68% of Host Community (D), 53% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and same as to PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (53%). PAPs economically displaced only (C) and New renters/ owners at relocation site (E) had relatively less percentages of school children 28% and 27% respectively.

Regarding the households with children above 5 years who do not attend school, 8% was found in PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B, followed by Host Community (D) 5% and New renters/owners (E) 2%.

Host community (D) had 11% of households with dropout children. Of PAPs households from Zone A and B, PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B were found same percentages (8%) of dropout children. PAPs economically displaced only (C) had 6% of dropout children and PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) had 2% of dropout children.

73% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and 68% Host community (D) had satisfaction upon their children's school. 50% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B and 20% of new renters/owners reported that they were satisfied with their children's school in last year.


The table (5.19-2) illustrates the responses of the rate on illness and serious illness reported by respondents. When PAPs and Non-PAPs felt ill, over 80% of respondents went to consult with a doctor at health clinic. Only 4% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) called a doctor to home. 17% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and also 17% of new owners/renters (E) were taken self-treatment. Nobody used traditional medicine to the illness.

65% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A and 56% PAPs economically displaced only (C) suffered serious illness in past 12 months, followed by PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B (42%) and PAPs sold/rented out at the relocation site (40%). There were 37% of new owners/renters at relocation site affected serious illness 12 months ago. The host community is the least (11%) suffered serious illness in past 12 months.

5.20 Environmental Condition

The table (5.20-1) reveals the current environmental conditions reported by types of respondents (A-E) in Phase II and respondent A in Phase I. Noise problems mentioned by all respondent categories are quarrelling, loud sound from music box and drunkard. The percentages of PAPs at the relocation site (A) who reported noise problems are 15% in Phase I and 3% in Phase II respectively. Both PAPs sold and/or rented out a house at relocation site (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) did not report noise problems while 16% of Host community (D) and 3% of New owners/renters (E) reported the noise problems.

In Zone A, 88% of PAPs at relocation site (A) experienced bad smell surrounding their houses. 50% reported that bad smell came from the toilet, 23% from drainage system and 8% from neighbor livestock. In Zone B, 19% PAPs at relocation site (A) reported that they got bad smell from drainage system (11%) and from toilet (8%) respectively. 10% of host community mentioned that 5% of bad smell came from neighborhood and 5% from drainage system.

All PAPs at relocation site (A) from Zone B, 97% of the new owners/renters at Zone (B) and 92% of PAPs at relocation site (A) from Zone A disposed their garbage with the garbage truck. 37% of PAPs sold/rented out a house at relocation site (B), 39% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and 42% of Host community (D) also disposed their garbage with the garbage truck. PAPs outside relocation site and Host Community burnt their solid waste in the summer as there is no separated dumpling place for them, with the percentages of PAPs economically displaced only (44%), PAPs sold/rented out a house at relocation site and Host Community (26%) each.

It can be significantly seen that only PAPs from Zone A and B as well as New Owner/Renter living at Relocation Site mainly used garbage truck to throw their wastes.

5.21 Vocational Training

The table (5.21-1) shows the participation of PAPs from Zone A and B in different types vocational trainings. Based on the interest of PAPs, different varieties of trainings were provided to respective PAPs and their household members. Provided trainings are electrical training, music training, driving training, sewing training, food processing training, mushroom planting training, agriculture training, construction training, workshop training, hair dressing training and security training.

In Zone A, 62% of household members from PAPs living at relocation site (A) attended vocational trainings. In Zone B, 31% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) attended the trainings, followed by 11% economically displaced only (C) and 9 % of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B).

Only 31% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A reported that the trainings they received were helpful in finding a job. The reasons why these trainings did not help to find a job vary. Majority of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A mentioned that they did not complete the course. The other reasons responded by PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone (A) are due to lack of appropriate jobs related with the training attended, still learning, family affairs, lack of manpower to start a business and lack of driving license. Percentages of households interested in further Vocational Training are 58% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone (B), 39% of economically displaced only and 23% of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site. It is found that the PAPs have learnt the value of the vocational training and it would be helpful to their income restoration in future.

The table (5.21-2) involves community communication on social activities associated with different types of respondents and community problem-solving and social relationships of the respondents.

In terms of community communication on social activities, 100% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) answered that social groups exist in their community, followed by 84% of PAPs sold/rented out at relocation site (B), 81% PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) and 68% of the host community (D), 56% PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B

and 10% of new owners/renters (E) at relocation site. These percentages show that PAPs and Non-PAPs living at RS from Zone B had the least interaction with social groups.

PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A received the information related with the government and social activities from several sources namely 100 HHs/10 HHs, village administrators, a committee with 10 PAPs, neighbor, monk and SEZ office. If compared with PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, the information reached to the rest of PAPs and Non-PAPs came from 100 HHs/10 HHs, village administrators and neighbor.

In terms of community problem-solving and social relationships of respondents, 100 households-head/10 households-head, village administrator and other governmental officials are major consultation channels made by PAPs and Non-PAPs for any issue which cannot be solved within family. As for Host community (D), they mainly used 100 households head/10 households head and village administer as consultation network.

19% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) revealed that they usually consult with 100 households-head/10 households-head and 19% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (B) reported that they consult with 100 households-head/10 households-head. As for Host community (D), 47% of them used 100 households-head/10 households-head and village administer as consultation network. Only 10% of new owners/renters (E) and 2% of PAPs sold and/or rented out at relocation site (B) ask for help to 100 households-head/10 households-head for the matters of solving community problems. It is found that among all of PAPs, economically displaced only (C) did not made any consultation with anyone else on the issues they faced. All of PAPs and Non-PAPs have social relationships with neighboring households.

2 Conclusion and Recommendations

2.1 Conclusion - Major Findings

Monitoring and evaluation on the progress of the resettlement works and IRP has been conducted by TWA Rural Development Service as the independent third party, focusing on PAPs of the Phase 1 and 2 areas only (where resettlement has already occurred). The objectives of the 2nd external monitoring for Phase 2 are to monitor the changes of socioeconomic conditions of PAPs during the interval period: to monitor the progress of resettlement works for PAPs and to provide recommendations in the implementation of RWP and IRP to improve the effectiveness.

Employment

As displacement disrupts traditional livelihood system of project affected people, their livelihood systems have been transformed. It is found that household head's job changes of people living at relocation site (A) from Zone (A) same as 23% to 4th EMS, although these changes have dramatically reduced from 41% to 10% after the periods of the 1st EMS and and the 2nd EMS. It can be said that livelihood system of people living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A becomes stable due to the number of their household head's job changes.

The highest dependency ratio (2.3) is found in PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, followed dependency ratio (1.9) of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B. High dependency ratio of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and Zone B shows that numbers of employed people are less than those of unemployed people and they have bigger family size than other different types of PAPs and non-PAPs. The burden falls to unbalance of income and expenditure. PAPs economically displaced only (C) have the least dependency ratio among them.

Income and Expenditure

Monthly average net income of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) was the highest, followed by PAPs economically displaced only (C). The spending on expenditure of PAPs economically displaced only (C) was the least among PAPs and Non-PAPs.

At the 2nd EMS if compared with the 1st EMS, monthly incomes of PAPs at the relocation site (A), PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) from Zone B decreased. The expenditure of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B increased while those of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) decreased at the 2nd EMS.

Throughout the periods of five consecutive EMS, the earning of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A slightly increased and their expenditure was decreasing before the 4th EMS. Since the 4th EMS, their spending on monthly expenditure has started to go up.

It is found that the monthly average net incomes of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) outweighed their monthly average expenditure. But on the other hand, monthly average expenditure of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and B was much higher than their monthly average net income. It tends to disadvantage them, resulting in high level of indebtedness. Unbalance of income and expenditure is also a key link in the chain of debt. As for Host community (D)

and New renters/owners at the relocation site (E), their income and expenditure appeared to balance.

Indebtedness

It is also found that the debt level of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B was the highest (7,000,000 MMK), followed by that of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) (3,000,000 MMK) and that of PAPs at relocation site (A) from Zone A (2,850,000 MMK) respectively. At the 5th EMS, the debt percentage of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A relatively dropped.

Lower percentage of borrowing money and lower indebtedness level can be seen in PAPs economically displaced only (C) from Zone B, Host community (D) and New owners/renters at relocation site (E) who have lower dependency ratio. Therefore, high level of indebtedness is indirect consequences of traditional livelihood disruption, unemployment, poor financial management and unbalance of income and expenditure.

Saving

Some of PAPs and Non-PAPs' households have saving practice. Their saving practice is also different. New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) are the highest in the percentage of savings; followed by PAPs economic displaced only (C). The percentages of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A as well as that of Zone B are the least in their savings among the respondents. Credit group members are only found in PAP at relocation site (A) from Zone A and Host Community (D). All of PAPs from Zone B and New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) have not microfinance program, except Host community where PACT Myanmar Microfinance Program exists. Although 77% of PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone A are credit group members through microfinance program introduced by the monk at the relocation site (A) Zone A, only one PAP can save money. In terms of credit group membership, New owners/renters at the relocation site (E) are not members of any credit group. This indicates that PAPs and New owners/renters living at the relocation site from Zone B, which is a relatively new settlement, are not yet accessing available credit groups.

Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water

It is observed that the percentage of all respondents who used to filter or boil their water becomes higher while the percentage of the respondents who drink the water directly becomes less compared to the 4th EMS. It is obviously seen that all respondents become more conscientious of their health by information sharing among them.

Current Environmental Condition

In terms of current environmental conditions at the relocation site, some PAPs living at the relocation site still reported bad toilet conditions because of being overflow and this is likely to harm their health in the long run. It is said that water is in good quality and water meter is equipped and its charges will be paid by PAPs. There is no complaint about electricity supply bill.

Most of PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A, PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone B, and New owners/renters at the relocation size from Zone B threw their garbage with

garbage trucks. Half of PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and Host community (D) also disposed their garbage with the garbage trucks.

Roads of the relocation site are worse than those of previous places as these roads are not good enough to walk and ride motorbikes. Unless the roads of relocation site turn to concrete roads, they will not be convenient.

Income Restoration Program

The IRP is in-kind assistance provided to PAPs in order to restore and stabilise their livelihoods and income sources. The IRP focuses on diversified economic activities for PAPs to generate income for three years after resettlement, to enable them to cover their basic needs after relocation. In order to restore their livelihoods, the development of Phase 2 is providing PAPs with an assistance package through the IRP, which includes vocational training and other support measures.

It is found that PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone (B) participated in vocational trainings more than 4th EMS. Percentages of households interested in further vocational training are increasing in PAPs at the relocation site (A) from Zone A and Zone B. It is proven that PAPs have learnt the value of the vocational training and it would be helpful for their income restoration in the future.

As part of income restoration program, delivery of vocational trainings is the biggest role in restoring their income and livelihoods in the aftermath of displacement as traditional economies and social networks of PAPs are eroded and they are vulnerable to adopt coping strategies.

Community Communication and Social Activity

It is found that over 80% of PAPs economically displaced only (C), PAPs sold/rented out a house at the relocation site (B) and PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone A exist social groups in their community. Over 50% of PAPs living at relocation site (A) from Zone B had social groups. These percentages show that PAPs living at the relocation site (A) from Zone B had low interaction with social groups.

2.2 Recommendations

The IRP aims to assist PAPs to have job opportunities for new income earning as daily casual workers and other off-farm workers in/around Thilawa SEZ and to be engaged in small-scale businesses. To find a job for PAP from farming to another income earning activity, it is essential to get the technical skills relevant to the needs of the factories at the SEZ. For the creation of employment opportunity to PAPs in the SEZ, it is important to get the information from the factories as their number of labor requirements and skills. And then relevant vocational training should be arranged to fit in the factories requirement.

It is advisable for all PAPs from Zone B to introduce microfinance program to adjust income and expenditure.
