1 Introduction

1.1 Background of Thilawa Special Economic Zone (SEZ)

Since November 2011, the Myanmar Government has been planning economic restructuring from the current structure that mainly depends on agriculture, forestry, and fisheries, to a new structure that focuses on labor-intensive industries such as manufacturing and services. To boost such economic restructuring it has been proposed to attract direct investment and market entry by companies from developed countries that have important resources such as technology, capital, management skills, and sales skills. The Myanmar government has placed a priority on attracting Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in order to achieve economic development. As such, three Special Economic Zones (SEZs) have




Figure 1.1 Location of Thilawa SEZ Development Area

been earmarked for development; these are in Thilawa, Dawei, and Kyaukphyu.

Thilawa SEZ is located in Yangon Region about 20 km on the southeast side of Yangon city. The Thilawa SEZ covers an area of about 2,400 ha alongside the Thilawa Port. Thilawa SEZ land for factories near Yangon, to promote the country's industrialization as well as generate jobs for Myanmar people. This project is expected to support sustainable economic development for Myanmar, contributing to improved living standards for its people and the development of industries that can meet rising domestic demand.

The land use plan for the entire development area of Thilawa SEZ has been prepared based on the above development concept. The Phase 1 area of about 400 ha (Phase I area) has been selected as a priority development. This Phase 1 area was planned to be developed as a base for significant investment from foreign and domestic companies, supporting the country's industrialization. Myanmar Japan Thilawa Development Ltd. (MJTD) is a joint venture between the Myanmar and Japanese governments and companies from both countries.

1.2 anagement of the Thilawa SEZ Resettlement Program

The Yangon Region Government (YRG) is the responsible body for implementation of the Resettlement Work Plan (RWP) that was prepared for the Phase 1 area. Two sub-committees have also been established, chaired by the Administrators of General Administration Departments (GADs) of Thanlyin and Kyauktan Townships. One sub-committee is Relocation Implementation Sub-Committee (RISC), which deals with disbursement of monetary assistance and the arrangement of living conditions at the relocation site (RS). The other sub-committee is Income Restoration Program Implementation Sub-Committee (IRPSC), which manages the implementation of the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The Thilawa SEZ Management Committee (TSEZMC) is a cooperative agency, supporting YRG, RISC and IRPSC in the smooth implementation of the RWP including the IRP. The responsibility of TSEZMC is: "to cooperate with YRG, RISC and IRPISC to support for resettlement works as needed, such as schedule

management of relocation and development of SEZ area and facilitation of the job recruitment of project affected persons (PAPs) in the SEZ area" in accordance with [Pg III.28, Interim Report on Technical Assistance for Preparation of Resettlement Work Plan in Myanmar].

1.3 Thilawa Phase 1 Resettlement and Income Restoration Program

1.3.1 Phase 1 Resettlement Program

From 4 to 26 April 2013, a socio-economic census (April Census) of all households living inside the Thilawa SEZ development area (approximately 2,400 ha) was conducted. A Detailed Measurement Survey (DMS) then followed to supplement the April Census and confirm the physical and productive assets of PAPs. The DMS was conducted between June and August 2013 while the final Phase 1 boundary was determined in early July 2013. At that time the PAPs of the Phase 1 area were identified and Cut-off Date for eligibility was set as 4 April 2013. Based on the DMS, the PAPs for the Phase 1 area were broadly divided into the following three categories.

- **A.** Living inside Phase 1 area (relocation required);
- B. Living outside Phase 1 area (but inside SEZ area) & Cultivating Inside Phase 1 area; and
- C. Living outside Phase 1 area (and outside SEZ area) & Cultivating Inside Phase 1 area.

As at the end of September 2013, a total of 81 households were regarded as eligible PAPs for the Phase I area and these households have a total population of 382 persons. Of the 81 households, 28 households cultivated farmland, covering a total of approximately 202 acres, inside the Phase 1 area. The other PAPs were mostly participating in casual labour/odd jobs, some livestock production and small enterprises.

As described in the RWP, the loss of house was assisted by providing a substitute house at the RS or the equivalent money to cover house construction costs for those who prefer to construct their own house at the RS. Monetary assistance was also provided for losses of other fixed assets (livestock barns), large livestock (buffalo and cow) and agriculture machines. Loss of means of livelihood for land-based and non-land-based income sources was assisted with monetary assistance for improving or restoring livelihoods to at least pre-project level. As for land-based income sources, monetary assistance was calculated based on crop yield by referring to national regulations. As for non-land-based income sources, monetary assistance was paid in the form of an allowance of wages for the period of disrupting income generating activities due to relocation. In addition to assistance for loss of assets and income sources, monetary assistance for moving, commuting and cooperation for relocation was provided to enhance smooth relocation and to support commuting after relocation.

Assistance for vulnerable groups was provided since relocation affects vulnerable groups more severely than others. The project defines as vulnerable a household headed by a woman, disabled person or an elderly person (over 61 years old), a household including a disabled person or a household below the poverty line.

1.3.2 Income Restoration Program (IRP)

Households living in or engaged in income generating activities inside the Phase I area whose livelihoods were affected due to implementation of the Phase 1 project are eligible to participate in the Income Restoration Program (IRP). The IRP is in-kind assistance provided to PAPs in order to restore and stabilise their livelihoods and income sources. The IRP focuses on diversified economic activities for PAPs to generate income for three years after resettlement, to enable them to cover their basic needs after relocation. In order to restore their livelihoods, the development of Phase 1 is providing PAPs with an assistance package through the IRP, which includes vocational training and other support measures.

The IRP aims to assist PAPs to have job opportunities in/around Thilawa SEZ and to be engaged in small scale businesses. The IRP is being provided to all PAPs including the following (as per RWP):

- a) Farmers who need to change from farming to another income earning activity;
- b) Daily casual workers and other off-farm workers who want to change job location;
- c) Unemployed people who want to improve their technical skills to find a job; and
- d) PAPs that do not need to change their current income earning activities but want to improve their technical skills and/or income level.

The IRP was initiated in December 2013 with participatory workshop with PAPs for needs survey. Based on the result of needs survey at the participatory workshop, vocational training and infrastructure improvement have been conducted as well as social-welfare support, such as official procedure support for obtaining identity card and school transfer to new school near the relocation site.

2 Objectives of the External Monitoring

Regular monitoring and evaluation of the progress of the resettlement works and IRP is conducted by independent third party, focusing on PAPs of the Phase 1 area only (where resettlement has already occurred). The objectives of the 3rd external monitoring are to:

- To monitor the changes of socio-economic conditions of PAPs during the interval period
- To monitor the progress of resettlement works for PAPs
- To provide recommendations in the implementation of RWP and IRP to improve effectiveness

3 Scope of the Monitoring

3.1 Work Period

Modification of questionnaire forms was done on 14th June 2016. Relevant documents were reviewed on 16th June and 17th June 2016. The socio-economic survey started on 20th June and ended on 3rd July 2016. Data entry in parallel to the survey was conducted and it completed on 3rd July 2016. Data cleaning and data analysis finished on the 13th August 2015. The first draft report was submitted on 22nd July 2016. The report will be finalized by the end of July 2016 after incorporating comments from JICA Expert Team.

3.2 Methodology Used and Sources of Information

- ✓ Document review
- ✓ Socio-economic survey for Project Affected Households. The household questionnaires used for this External Monitoring are included in Annexes 2 to 6.
- ✓ One focus group discussion with microfinance committee
- ✓ Observation on project sites

3.3 Impact Monitoring of the RWP Implementation

To see the impact of the RWP implementation, the socio-economic survey was conducted to see any changes in PAF's livelihood. The survey parameters of the socio-economic survey were designed to obtain data and information on a range of specific issues as follows: the conditions of the RS and housing and infrastructure; settlement at the RS; restoration/re-establishment of livelihoods and living standards;

the effectiveness, impact and sustainability of entitlements and the IRP; and the potential need for further improvements. The parameters chosen were organised in the survey questionnaires in the following themes:

- Demography;
- Livelihoods, Income and Expenditure;
- Housing and Infrastructure at RS;
- Ownership of Assets;
- Education and Health Care;
- Environmental Conditions: and
- Communications, Social Networks and Social Cohesion.

A series of open and closed questions were included in the household questionnaire under each of these key themes. As described above, these were tailored for the different groups targeted in the survey. The questionnaire forms for the socio-economic survey are attached in Annex 2-6.

3.4 Targeted Groups for Monitoring

A number of different categories of PAPs were targeted for the monitoring survey as well as members of the Host Community at Myaing Tharyar for a comparison with the resettled/displaced population. It was also important to obtain data from new residents at the RS, including those who have rented or purchased houses from PAPs. **Error! Reference source not found.**2 lists the different categories of people targeted for the survey, the number of households targeted in each group and the number actually surveyed.

Notes: The following reasons are the difference between number of targeted households to be surveyed and number of household survey actually.

i) 2 households from PAPs living in RS could not be surveyed because one PAP stayed unanswered as happening in the second EMS. Another PAP couple has passed away.

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¹ E.g., Renters or new owners of houses sold by PAPs at the RS.

- ii) 2 households from PAPs who sold/rented their house at RS could not be surveyed because the survey team tried to contact one PAP through mobile phone several time during survey period but he is not also available. Another PAPs from TaikGyi was not available. PAPs who sold/rented their houses at RS and PAPs economically displaced only are living diversely and the survey team found it difficult to reach their living places in the raining season.
- iii) Two households from PAPs economically displaced only could not be surveyed. Although survey team tried to get contact him through his mobile phone many times, there was no answer. Besides, survey team did not have his contact address.

3.5 Organization of the Survey Team

The team of TWA Rural Development Service (known herein as "TWA") consists of a number of Myanmar national staff, all of whom have experience in the field of rural livelihood improvement, participatory community development and community mobilisation. 4 Process of Monitoring

Existing Data Review and Preparation of the Field Activities (Site Visits, Socio-economic Survey) TWA reviewed and examined the profile of the PAPs and also reviewed progress reports such as the RWP and IRP documentations prepared by JICA expert team. TWA then mobilized a survey team comprised of surveyors in June 2016. TWA provided one-day training to the surveyors on the objective of the survey, the meanings of the survey questionnaires, the responsibility and role of the surveyors, and data collection and data entry procedures.

4.1 Additional Data Collection and Data Entry

The field survey of the Socio-economic survey started on 20th June 2016 and ended on 3rd July 2016. The surveyors explained the questionnaires to the survey respondents and collected the data, and checked all the data not to be missed in the questionnaire forms in the field. After the data gathering process, the data was processed in parallel to data cleaning. The data input was then cross-checked again to ensure the relevance to the information sought through the questionnaires between June and July 2016.

4.2 Data Analysis

Data was processed and analysed in Microsoft Excel through the following steps by data analyst and surveyors during July 2016. Cleaned the data and entered it into an excel file;

- Listed tables and charts inferred from the baseline and current data;
- Summarized the data collected:

- Finalized the results of the survey; and
- Created charts and tables to display the survey results; and interpreted the charts and tables.

4.4 Limitations

This external monitoring report/evaluation is mainly based on interactions with PAPs through the socio-economic survey and review of the existing monitoring documents and other resettlement-related records by the external monitoring consultants. This evaluation is not a review of the RWP against international standards, and no assessment has been made about whether or not the RWP is fit-for-purpose in accordance with the relevant standards.

5 Results of Socio-economic Survey of the Project Affected Persons

5.1 Demography

(1) Household Characteristics

Household characteristics of household categories (A-E) have not changed much during the period between the second EMS and the third EMS. The population of all respondent categories (A-E) surveyed at the third EMS has 547 people. The population comprised of working age (59%), under 18 (36%) and above 60 (5%). Gender ratio is 1:1. There are altogether 4 disabled people including 2 people from PAPs (A-C) and 1 person from Host Community (D) and 1 person from the renter (E) at the third EMS. Family size of each household ranges from 4 to 5 and dependency ratio is 1 to 2 for all household categories (A-E).

The data revealed that dependency rate remains unchanged as around 1.9 for PAPs at RS and increased from 1.4 to 1.6 for PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS and also increased from 1.39 to 1.5 for PAPs who economically displaced only. It can be concluded that dependency rate of PAPs who sold/rent houses at the RS (B) became significantly increased during the period between second and third monitoring result. At the third EMS, 8 PAPs households at the RS have moved as the category of PAP who sold/rent houses at the RS (B).

The actual number of PAPs (A-C) was 81 households. Out of 81 PAFs, 77 representatives of the PAPs were available at the time of conducting the socio economic survey at the Third EMS, while the second EMS and the first EMS have 75 representatives and 66 representatives of PAFs respectively.

(2) Changes in Job for Household Heads

Each category of PAPs (A, B, C) was asked to indicate whether or not the Household Head has the same job compared to the second external monitoring survey. It is found that the percentage of the household heads' job changes in all respondent categories (A-E) significantly dropped from 42% to 9% during the period of the second EMS and the third EMS as shown in table 5.2. The data showed that there were not much job changes for household heads and it can also be seen that their jobs were getting stable at the period of third EMS.

5.2 Livelihood, Income and Expenditure

(1) Income Sources and Levels of All Respondents

It is observed that common income sources found for all PAPs and non-PAPs remain unchanged at the third EMS; they are odd jobs, wages workers and livestock raising activities.

Average household income of all respondent categories (A-E) is 347,227 Kyat per month and 4,166,727 Kyat per annum. Among the respondent categories PAPs (A-C), although PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS (B) remain the best-off economic condition in terms of income for first EMS, second EMS and third EMS, it is surprisingly found that only PAPs at the RS (A) slightly increase their income with the monthly average increment of 30,000 Kyat and PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS (B) and PAPs who economically displaced only (C) slightly decrease their income with the monthly average amount of 11,000 Kyat and 18,000 Kyat respectively if compared with the second EMS. The Host Community (D) and New Owner/Renters at RS (E) have income increment at the third EMS. Their monthly average income increment is 130,000 Kyat for Host Community (D) and 196,000 Kyat for New Owner/Renter at RS (E).

Although PAPs at the RS stayed under the condition of the lowest per capita income at the third EMS, their income increased small amount of earnings if compared with the second EMS. It is found that several PAPs at the RS (A) has transformed as PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS (B) at the third EMS by selling their houses at RS and staying at RS as renters.



(2) Income Sources and Levels for PAPs before Resettlement, First EMS, Second EMS and Third EMS

Main and secondary income sources of PAPs and their income levels are collected at the third EMS as collected before resettlement, first EMS, second EMS so that comparison and changes can be made among before resettlement, first EMS, second EMS and third EMS.

Table 5.5 shows that odd jobs, wage workers and home businesses can be seen as common livelihoods of PAPs (A-C). The percentage of PAPs who are engaged in odd jobs extremely increased compared with the second EMS, reaching to 45% as nearly as the percentage of before resettlement and first EMS. On the other hand, over half of PAPs who work at others income sources like home business dropped sharply at the third EMS. The percentage of PAPs raising livestock slightly decreased compared with the second EMS. There are only a few PAPs who are still doing rice farming and cash crops due to lack of farmlands.

Table 5.6 and 5.7 shows the main income and secondary sources of Host Community (D) and New Owners/Renters (E) throughout the First EMS, Second EMS and Third EMS. It is found that majority of income sources for New Owners/ Renters (E) comes from the engagement of wage workers followed by odd jobs. As for Host Community (D), almost half of the residents (40%) are employed in odd jobs followed by wage workers.

Table 5.8 and Table 5.9 indicated that the numbers of PAPs who increased/decreased monthly income and monthly expenditure after the period of first EMS and second EMS. It is found that 51% increased their monthly income while next 40% decreased their income among PAPs (A-C). 5% of PAPs' income neither increased nor decreased. 55% of PAPs who sold/rented a house at the RS (B) increased their income, followed by 52% of PAPs at the RS (A) and 38% of PAPs economically displaced only (C). Decreased income happened to 46% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and 39% each for PAPs at the RS and PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS. There is no much different percentage of household expenditure increase/decrease in PAPs (B) compared with the 2nd EMS result. There are 47% of PAPs (A-C) increasing their monthly household expenditure at the third EMS.

(3) Location of Work

Majority of all respondent categories (A-E) work at Kyauktan and Thanlyin townships because these townships are not very far from their houses compared with other townships. PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs who economically displaced only (B) mainly work in Kyauktan, followed by Thanlyin and Yangon. Thanlyin is major location of work for PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B). There are some respondent categories (A-E) who are working in Yangon. In addition of Kyauktan, Thanlyin and Yangon, New owner/ renter (E) go for work in other townships because they come from different locations.

(4) Transportation to Work

Means of transportation to work for all PAPs and non-PAPs are on foot, motorbike, bicycle, motorbike taxi, ferry bus and public transport. All respondent categories (A-E) mostly ride motorbike to work (28%), followed by public transport (25%), motorbike taxi and walk (16%) each. Majority of PAPs (A) go to work by their own motorbikes. PAPs sold/rented house at the RS (B) mostly go for a walk to work because they are living the places close to work. PAPs who economically displaced only (C) have the same proportion (30)% each in going to work on foot, by motorbike taxi and by public transport. Most of Host Communities (D) take public transport for going to work. Nearly half of New owners/renters (E)

usually go to work with public transport. 11% of all categories of respondent (A-E) who are engaged in garment factories take a ferry bus that is a kind of transportation arrangement from these factories.

(5) Household Expenditure

The table 5.10 showed average monthly and annual expenditure of respondents (A-E) to reveal comparisons and changes among 1st EMS, 2nd EMS and 3rd EMS. The annual expenditure on Food and Non-food items is one indicator to assess the standard of living of a household. Food items consist of expenditure on rice, oils, meat/fish, vegetables, etc. while Non-food items consist of expenditure on electricity, water, education, health care, clothes, etc.


It is found that average household expenditure of all respondents (A-E) went down from the period of 1st EMS to 3rd EMS. PAPs Economically displaced only (C) remain the highest expenditure levels, followed by PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) while the Renters/New Owners at the RS (E) stay the least expenditure. It is seen that the average expenditure of the PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) slightly dropped down from the period of 1st EMS to 3rd EMS.

Although the average income increased in all the groups except PAPs sold/rented houses at RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) compared to the 2nd external monitoring results, the average expenditure decreased in respondent categories (A, B, C and E) except Host Community (D) from the 2nd external monitoring results, still the average monthly expenditure exceeds the average monthly income for categories A and C. It is also found that the deficit amount at the 3rd EMS for PAPs at the RS (A) was not as high as that of the 2nd EMS. Their income of Host Community (D) and New Owner/ Renter (E) still exceeds their expenditure.

At the third EMS, annual food expenditure and non-food expenditure spent by all PAPs (A-C) remain unchanged compared with the second EMS.



(6) Savings

There are increasing number of PAPs (A-C) who have savings compared with the second EMS while there are decreasing number of Non-PAPs (D and E) who have savings. PAPs economically displaced only (C) have the highest savings (62%), followed by 55% PAPs living at the RS (A) and 47% Host Community (D) and 45% PAPs who sold/rented a house at the RS (B). Renters/New Owners (E) at the RS have the least savings (27%).

Saving patterns by all categories of respondents (A-E) are saving at home/bank, microfinance, investing in business and purchasing livestock. 32 PAPs (A-C) answered that they usually save money through microfinance introduced by the monk at the RS. It is said that the microfinance scheme is entitled to PAPs (A-C) only. Some from PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) who are living in diverse places reported that they quit the microfinance scheme as they found it difficult to attend meetings very often at the RS and to come and save money there.

New Owner/Renter at the RS (E) also reported that most of them are not accessible microfinance scheme because there are preferences between PAPs and Non-PAPs. Majority of the PAPs (A-C) revealed that

delay occurred to borrow money so far even though they have saved money over one year. Accordingly, some microfinance members have quit the credit group. If compared with the 2nd EMS, the membership of credit group decreased in PAPs living at the RS (A) 68% while that of PAPs economically displace only increased to 62%.

(7) Debt and Indebtedness

At the third EMS, the PAPs living in the RS (A) still stood the highest level of debt among PAPs (A-C). But on the other hand, the indebtedness of PAPs living in the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) dropped to 55% and 45% respectively compared with the 2nd EMS and the 1st EMS. The level of indebtedness decreased sharply for those PAPs economically displaced only (C).

(8) Vulnerable People / Households

Vulnerable people/households are defined as a household headed by a woman, disabled person or elderly (over 61 years old) person; a household including a disabled person; and a household below the poverty line. 19 vulnerable PAPs was found at the third EMS. They are 7 women headed households, 2 households headed by a disabled person, 3 elderly headed households, 4 households below the poverty line and 3 households with a disabled family member.

5.3 Food Security

Own production for all PAPs (A-C) has significantly reduced and bought their own food since resettlement. For Host Community (D) and Renters/New Owners (E) usually buy their own food. This situation remains also unchanged during the period of the first EMS and the second EMS. Therefore, some questionnaires related with main source of food have been removed at the stage of questionnaire modification for the third EMS after consultation with JICA expert team, assuming that a high proportion of all respondent categories (A-E) cannot also produce their own food any more.

It is found that there is no much difference on meat consumption pattern of all respondent categories (A-E) during the period of the first EMS and the second EMS. No matter the respondents are rich or poor, over 90 % of all the categories of respondents (A-E) feed their children two or more meals per day. At the third EMS, the questionnaires related with number of meals consumed by children and meat consumption by respondents were also deleted.

At the third EMS, 3% of PAPs (A-C) and 4% of Renters/New Owners reported that they experienced food shortages in the past 12 months.

5.4 Housing and Infrastructure

(1) Housing Ownership





Figure 5.2 Housing Ownership of PAPs

Figure 5.1 shows household ownership of each respondent categories (A-E). The figure 5.2 shows housing ownership of PAPs only: PAPs at RS (A), PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C). Out of total 64 PAPs altogether from 31 PAPs at the RS (A) and 33 PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) to be surveyed, only 46 PAPs own their houses at the time of the third EMS. The graph showed that housing ownership of PAPs (A and B) at the RS has been decreasing as several households from PAPs living at the RS (A) sold their houses and stayed at the RS as renters. But on the other hand, there are increasing new owners and renters living at the RS. Of 22 households from Category (E), 5 households (20%) became new owners and 19 households (76%) became renters at the RS. 100% of Host Community (D) said that they own their house. 62% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) own their houses.

Figure 5.1 Housing Ownership of Respondents

(2) Sanitation Facilities

Majority of the respondent categories (A-E) are using improved latrines/ septic tank systems for their sanitation facilities (Figure 5.3). All households (100%) from the PAPs at the RS (A), PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host Community use improved latrine. 96% of New Owners/Renters and 76% of PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) use improved latrine. Among the respondents (A-E), traditional latrine is used by 6% (5 HHs) of PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B). 9% (3 HHs) of PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) and 4% (1 HH) New Owner/Renters at the RS (E) have no toilet.

Figure 5.3 Types of Toilets Used by Respondents





Figure 5.4 Types of Toilets Used by PAPs

(3) Sources of Water

The main water sources used by all respondent categories (A-E) are private wells, collective wells and buying water. 68% of New Owners/ Renters (E) usually collect water from the collective wells and another 24% buy water from the private wells at the relocation site. 35% of PAPs at the RS (A) use collective wells and next 35% buy water and 19% have private wells in their compounds at the relocation site. Private wells are mostly used by PAPs economically displaced only (C) 62%, followed by PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) 58% and Host Community (D) 47%. Very few respondents used rain water.

Figure 5.5 Sources of Water Used by Respondents





Figure 5.6 Sources of Water Used by PAPs

(4) Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water

Majority of respondent categories (A-E) filter water before drinking. The high proportion of Host Community (D) boil water before drinking. Very few New Owners/Renters buy purified drinking water.

Figure 5.7 Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water by Respondents





Figure 5.8 Preparation Patterns for Drinking Water amongst PAPs



(5) Standing Water around House/Yard


The figure indicated the condition of standing water around house experienced by all respondent categories (A-E). Heavy and continuous rain causes standing water around house in the rainy season. As a consequence of filling the soil around houses at the RS done by JICA last year, it can be seen vividly that the percentage of standing water their houses has been significantly decreasing in PAPs at the RS (A) since the 2nd EMS. On the other hand, PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) slightly increased the percentage of flooding water around their houses after raining compared with the first EMS and the second EMS. For PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host Community (D), the percentage of standing water slightly reduced at the third EMS.

Figure 5.9 Standing Water at Houses amongst Respondents




(6) Availability of Electricity

As shown in Figure 5.10, over 70% of PAPs and Non PAPs are accessible to electricity. All the PAPs at the RS (A) and renters/new owners (E) who live at the RS are available power supply from meter box installed (Figure 5.11). A total of 84% of the host community (D) also has access to electricity. Only 45% of PAPs who sold/rented their house at the RS (B) and 69% of PAPs economically displaced (C) have access to electricity as most of them live in rural and semi-urban areas where there are shortages of electricity supply (they use candles and battery powered devices for energy and lighting) (Figure 5.12).





(7) Sense of Security and Safety at Current House

All New owner/Renters (E) mentioned that they have sense of security for living in RS although they are new comers. All of Host community feel secure at current houses because of old settlement and their natives. Among PAPs (A-C), 100% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) have a sence of security at current houses, followed by PAPs living at the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS 94% each.

(8) Perception of Living Conditions and Infrastructure at the Relocation Site




Figure 5.14 Comparison of Standard of Living to first External Monitoring Survey

The Figure 5.14 showed the perception on housing, fly proof toilet, water availability and road condition described by the RS residents, comparing with the period of the second External Monitoring Survey. At the third EMS, majority of PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) perceived that living conditions and infrastructure at the RS remain unchanged compared to the second EMS in which the majority of PAPs at the RS (A) perceived that there are some improvements for the living conditions and infrastructure at the RS compared to first External Monitoring Survey (EMS). The housing condition and toilet facility of PAPs at the RS (A) are better than those of those of PAPs who sold/rented out their houses at RS (B). Very few PAPs (A-B) mentioned that access to water and road condition at the third EMS became better than the second EMS. 29% of PAPs answered that toilet facilities became worse at the third EMS. The PAP who sold/rented out their houses at the RS (B) report their living condition and infrastructure compared to the second EMS as 21% report a better house condition; report 6% each for better toilet facilities, better access to water and better road conditions.

5.5 Ownership of Movable Assets

As for PAPs (A-C), ownership of movable assets except mobile phone did not change much at the third EMS although there was a considerable ownership of the assets compared with the baseline. The ownership of mobile phones has considerably reduced. PAPs (A-C). The number of battery and radio also decreased.

5.6 Education for Children

Attendance and Drop-Out Rates and Access to Education Facilities

There were not many changes on education at the third EMS as not many changes happened during the interval between the first EMS and the second EMS. Over 60% of respondents except (E) have school children at their houses. PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) have the highest percentage of school children (85%), followed by 74% PAPs at the RS (A), 68% of Host Community (D) and 62% of PAPs economically displaced only (C). New owner/renters at RS have the least percentage of school children (24%). It is found that majority of the respondents are satisfied with their children school.

There are no children above 5 years who do not attend school in PAPs economically displaced only (E) and New owner/renter at RS (E). PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) have one child each who do not go to school at their school age. There are two households each that children dropped out of school in PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B).

5.7 Health Care

When household members from all respondent categories (A-E) fall ill, their treatment patterns are seeking the treatment from health clinic, hospital, self-treatment and calling doctor or health assistant to home. Going to health clinic is the common treatment to cure serious illness for majority of the respondents. It is found that majority of respondent categories (A-E) go to health clinic followed by self-treatment at the third EMS, the second EMS and the first EMS.

27% of PAPs (A-C) reported that their household members suffered serious illness for instance: food poison, dengue fever, abortion and broken arm in 12 months ago. Compared with the first EMS and second EMS, serious illness rate of household members in 12 months ago significantly decreased in PAPs economically displaced only (C), followed by PAPs at the RS (A) and PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS (B). There were not many changes in percentages for family members of Host Community (D) and New owner/renters at the RS (E) affected serious illness at the third EMS.





5.8 **Environmental Conditions**

Table 5.21 reveals the current environmental conditions reported by respondent categories (A-E) at the third EMS. Noise problems mentioned by all respondent categories are quarrelling, loud sound from music box and drunkard. The percentage of PAPs at the RS (A) who reported noise problems reached to 45%, the highest percentage among three external monitoring surveys. At the third EMS, the percentage of Host community (D) who reported noise problems increased while those for New owner/Renter at RS (E) decreased. For PAPs economically displaced only (C), the percentage of noise problem remained unchanged.

For those who are living at the RS, the percentage of PAPs at the RS (A) and New Owners/Renters (E) who faced bad smell near their houses dramatically reduced at the third EMS. On the other hand, the higher percentage of Host community (D) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) faced bad smell around their houses compared with the second EMS. It is learnt that JICA team arranged garbage truck to collects the trash at the RS. Accordingly, the complaint of bad smell came from garbage pit was not found at the RS.

11 each from the respondent PAPs at the RS (A) reported that most smell come from toilet and drainage system. And only 2 New Owners/Renters (E) also mentioned bad smell from toilet.

PAPs at RS (A) and New Owner/Renter (E) packed their solid waste with plastic bags in the house compound and the garbage truck usually come and collect the waste at the RS. It is found that PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B), PAPs economically displaced only (C) and Host community (D) either disposed their garbage at their convenience or burnt them in the summer as there is no separated dumpling place for them.

5.9 Participation in the Income Restoration Program (IRP)

68% of PAPs at the RS (A) participated in the different types of vocational trainings, followed by 46% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and 39% of PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B). It is found that there are increasing percentage of PAPs economically displaced only (C) who attended the trainings at the third EMS. Majority of PAPs (A-C) attended driving, tailoring and electronic trainings. Those who attended driving training are 54% of PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B), 33% of PAPs economically displaced only (C) and 10% of PAPs at the RS (A) respectively. Most of PAPs at the RS (A) attended tailoring training. 33% of PAPs (A-C) said that the trainings received are helpful to find a job. 43% of PAPs (A-C) are interested in further vocation trainings to attend.

The followings reasons why the trainings did not help them find a job are almost the same with the second EMS;

- Some did not attend the training fully.
- For driving training, driving license is required to drive heavy vehicles.
- * There is lack of investment to start a business.

5.10 Communications, Social Networks and Cohesion

(1) Community Information Sources and Communication

Majority of the respondent categories (A-E) reported that social groups such as funeral support group and social welfare groups exist in their community. The information on government and social activities came from different sources such as 100HHs/10HHs, village administrator, other governmental officials, NGOs, monk, a committee with 10 PAPs and neighbor. Most of the respondent categories (A-E) received the information through 100 household head and 10 household heads. It is found that monk and a committee consisted of 10 PAPs are also social information provider at the RS.

(2) Community and Family Dispute Resolution

No matter general issues or issues concerning at relocation site are, most of the respondent categories (A-E) reported that they consult these issues with 100-household head/10-household head (53%), followed by village administrator (15%). 19% of PAPs living at the RS (A) consult with the monk. It is also found that 25% of PAPs and Non-PAPs answered that they did not have any problem to ask consultations. At the third EMS, all of the respondent categories (A-E) have good social relationships with their neighbors because of proximity of houses and their long stay.

6 Conclusion and Recommendations

6.1 Conclusion - Major Findings

Employment, Income and Expenditure

Household heads' job changes significantly went down from 42% from 9% at the third EMS. On the other hand, the percentage of PAPs who are engaged in odd jobs extremely increased compared with the second EMS, reaching to 45% as nearly as the percentage of before resettlement and first EMS. And over half of PAPs who work at others income sources like home business dropped sharply at the third EMS. The percentage of PAPs raising livestock slightly decreased compared with the second EMS.

The average income increased in all the groups except PAPs sold/rented houses at RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) compared to the 2nd external monitoring results, the average expenditure decreased in respondent categories (A, B, C and E) except Host Community (D) from the 2nd external monitoring results, still the average monthly expenditure exceeds the average monthly income for categories A and C. It is also found that the deficit amount at the 3rd EMS for PAPs at the RS (A) was not as high as that of the 2nd EMS. But PAPs at the RS stayed under the condition of the lowest per capita income.

It is found that most of their income sources have been changing during three EMS period. In the light of income and expenditure findings, it can be said that they have begun to cope with appropriate livelihood in new environment for their survival.

Indebtedness

The indebtedness of PAPs living in the RS (A) and PAPs sold/rented a house at RS (B) dropped to 55% and 45% respectively compared with the 2nd EMS and the 1st EMS. But the PAPs living in the RS (A) still stood the highest level of debt among PAPs (A-C). It is also found that several PAPs at the RS (A) has transformed as PAPs who sold/rented a house at RS (B) at the third EMS by selling their houses at RS and staying at RS as renters. PAPs economically displaced only (C) sharply decreased the level of indebtedness. It can be said that social welfare support program is quite beneficial to reduce their burden of the indebtedness level of PAPs (A-C).

Savings

All categories of respondents (A-E) are saving at home/bank, microfinance, investing in business and purchasing livestock. 32 PAPs (A-C) answered that they usually save money through microfinance introduced by the monk at the RS. Some from PAPs sold/rented a house at the RS (B) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) who are living in diverse places reported that they quit the microfinance scheme as they found it difficult to attend meetings very often at the RS and to come and save money there. Majority of the PAPs (A-C) revealed that delay occurred to borrow money so far even though they have saved money over one year. New Owner/Renter at the RS (E) also reported that most of them are not accessible microfinance scheme because there are preferences between PAPs and Non-PAPs.

It is found that all of the PAPs became microfinance group members not mainly because they want to have their own savings but because they have a purpose to borrow the money from the project. That is why, most of them have withdrawn their saving money when they do not receive the loan. In addition, they are not satisfied with microfinance committee for the selection of their business plan.

Current Environmental Condition

It can be seen vividly that the percentage of standing water their houses has been significantly decreasing in PAPs at the RS (A) since the 2nd EMS as a consequence of filling the soil around houses at the RS done by JICA last year,

For those who are living at the RS, the percentage of PAPs at the RS (A) and New Owners/Renters (E) who faced bad smell near their houses dramatically reduced at the third EMS. On the other hand, the higher percentage of Host community (D) and PAPs economically displaced only (C) faced bad smell around their houses compared with the second EMS. It is learnt that garbage truck has been arranged by TSMC with the support of JICA expert team to collect the trash at the RS. PAPs at RS (A) and New Owner/Renter (E) packed their solid waste with plastic bags in the house compound and the garbage truck usually come and collect the waste at the RS. Accordingly, the complaint of bad smell came from garbage pit was not found at the RS.

Income Restoration Program

As part of IRP, PAPs received different kinds of vocational trainings depending on individual request. Some PAPs at the RS are producing and selling Mushroom, utilizing the skills and knowledge gained from the training when conducting the third EMS. It is also learnt that some PAPs have worked as

security guards after security guard training. Some PAPs answered that job vacancy announcements are found at the notice board in front of community hall at the RS.

6.2 Recommendations

Major recommendations for the third EMS are emphasized on microfinance scheme order to take some actions for sustainability of the microfinance scheme as PAPs have misunderstanding the concept and microfinance committee is also lack of criteria upon selection process of business plan.

- 1) It is suggested that the selection criteria of business plan should be set clearly and transparent among PAPs and microfinance committee prior to selecting the business plan submitted by PAPs. And these criteria should be written down so that all members can notice.
- 2) It is also recommended to take into consideration for those who are in vulnerable group how to incorporate them in microfinance scheme although they do not have tendency to meet the selection criteria of business plan.
- 3) It is advisable that microfinance committee comprised of 10 representatives PAPs needs to be strengthened so that the committee can run the microfinance scheme efficiently and effectively in the long run.
